A petition was received from the rockmen in the employ of the Department, asking an increase of compensation.

On motion of Commissioner Green:

Resolved, That the Treasurer be requested to present at the next meeting of the Board a statement showing the rates of wages paid by this Department, the Department of Public Works, and by contractors generally.

Commissioner Green offered the following:

Resolved, That the Treasurer be authorized to provide a temporary base and to make the necessary arrangements for the celebration of the erection of the Shakespear Monument.

Resolved, That the Treasurer report to the Board, at the next meeting, what progress has been made in the surveying of Westchester County, and what engineers and other persons are employed thereon, together with their compensation.

From W. H. Grant, Civil and Topographical Engineer, relative to proposals for laying out, mapping and monumenting streets, in the town of West Farm.

Referred to the Treasurer, with power.

From W. H. Grant, relative to stone-arched bridge designed to be built across Spuyten Duyvil Creek at Kingsbridge, and now transferred from Department of Public Works to the Department of Public Parks.

On motion of Mr. Fields, said communication was referred to the Treasurer, with directions to confer with the contractor for building said bridge, and report thereon to the Board.

The PRESIDENT called the attention of the Board to the circumstances under which Mr. Waterhouse Hawkins had been employed on the Central Park, and to the fact that while pursuing the work for which he was engaged, he had been suddenly and without explanation suspended, without pay, by the Treasurer. Mr. Hawkins represented that injustice and pecuniary loss had thus been brought upon him. HEADQUARTERS OF THE VETERANS OF THE WAR OF 1812.

No. 4 City Hall Place, N. Y. City.

To the Commissioners of Public Parks:

Gentlemen,—The Veterans of the War of 1812 are desirous of celebrating the coming 25th day of November (Evacuation day), as has been their custom for many years, and would most respectfully request your Honorable Body to erect a suitable libertypole, and furnish it with a suitable American flag. It is proposed by us that it be erected on the old Fort within the enclosure of the Central Park, near 110th street and Seventh avenue, built by us during the war of 1812, for the protection of the city of New York. We would most respectfully suggest to your Honorable Body that the ceremony takes place on the coming Evacuation day, and that a hickory pole, in the rough, be erected in commemoration of the noble old patriot Andrew Jackson, who whipped the British at New Orleans, on the 8th of January, 1815. There are some now living who assisted in erecting the Fort, and who will be with us on the occasion; and we would also request that we have the exclusive privilege of hoisting the flag on the 25th November, 22d February and the 4th July.

Whereupon Mr. Green offered the following:

Whereas, The uncertainty which prevails as to the validity and legal effect of Sect. 7 of Chap. 872, of the Laws of 1872, is in the opinion of this Board exceedingly prejudicial to the public interest; and

Whereas, The question of laying out of new streets, and the alteration of the grades of streets heretofore under the charge of this Department, is to be determined by the validity and legal effect of the said statute, Chap. 872, Sect. 7, of the Laws of 1872.

And in view of the serious consequences which might result

from any illegal action on the part of this Board, or of any other department of the city, in reference to the taking of property for new streets, or the alteration of the grades of streets, and the large amount of assessments which depend upon a strict compliance with the law in the execution of the works heretofore admittedly under the exclusive charge of this Department.

Resolved, That the President of this Department forthwith instruct such actions to be taken as he may be advised to be necessary on the part of this Department, and the Commissioners thereof to have the powers and duties of this Department, and said Commissioners judicially ascertained and determined, and for this purpose the President is authorized to employ such counsel as he may determine.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said preambles and resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said three resolutions, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Mr. Green offered the following:

Resolved, That the Treasurer be authorized to execute a license with Columbus Ryan, for the exclusive privilege to sell refreshments on the Central Park, for a term of five years next ensuing the expiration of the present license to Radford & Ryan, and that the sum to be paid for said privilege to be an amount not exceeding ten per cent., nor less than five per cent. of the gross amount of sales, as shall be determined, from time

to time, by the Board; said license to contain all necessary restrictions to insure to the Board the proper control of the said business, and to be submitted to the Board for approval before execution.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

On motion of Mr. Green, the Secretary was instructed to prepare proper response to said communications, to be laid before the Board at its next meeting.

The Landscape Architect presented a report, in compliance with resolution adopted September 4th, p, 502 of the minutes in regard to changing the Sheep-fold to an Aquarium.

Referred back, for further investigation.

The Landscape Architect submitted a communication from P. L. Sclater, Secretary of the London Zoological Society, requesting exchange of certain animals, accompanied by letter from W. A. Conklin, recommending the same.

Referred to the Landscape Architect, with power.

The TREASURER presented a claim of Charles Guidet for interest on estimate for paving Transverse Road No. 3, as allowed by order of the Supreme Court, also for balance due for paving Transverse Road No. 1.

Mr. Green offered the following:

Resolved, That the claims of Charles Guidet be referred to the President, and that the Treasurer be authorized to pay the same upon the certificate of the President.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Green, Stebbins, Blatchford—3.

Mr. Green offered the following:

Resolved, That the salary of Frederick W. Whittemore, as Secretary, from September 1st to October 24th, inclusive, being date of his appointment as Treasurer, be fixed at the rate now allowed him.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Green, Stebbins, Blatchford—3.

Mr. Green called up the preambles and resolutions relative to street opening north of 155th street, together with a communication from John J. Serrell, C. E., on the same subject presented by him at the last meeting, and moved that the same be printed and made a special order for the next meeting. The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said motion, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Green, Stebbins, Blatchford—3.

COPY OF PREAMBLES AND RESOLUTIONS.

First.—Whereas that portion of the city of New York, lying northward of 155th street, was not laid out under the Law of 1807, except by extending the Tenth avenue through the same, but has been recently laid out under subsequent legislation by the Commissioners of the Central Park.

Second.—Whereas the natural surface of the land, its differences of elevation, its hillsides and declivities, have required a plan different from the rectangular system of parallel streets and avenues adopted below 155th street, and more nearly conforming to the natural surface; so that the blocks between the streets vary greatly in size and in shape, and are many of them bounded by diagonal and curved lines.

Third.—Whereas the whole of the aforesaid portion of the city aforesaid has been thoroughly surveyed, and the maps thereof, laying out the streets, roads, avenues and public places thereon, have been made and many of them duly filed, and the remainder will be filed in a short time.

Fourth.—Whereas the public interests and those of the property owners require that these streets and avenues not already opened should now be opened, and the title thereof be acquired by the city, so that this section of the city may be ready for the improvements pressing in upon it.

Fifth.—Whereas, in a few cases, proceedings have been commenced for the opening of some of these streets, in some cases for a single street in each proceeding, and in others for a group of streets in one proceeding.

Sixth.—Whereas these proceedings have been carried far enough to show the contrast between the results to be attained by opening all these streets, roads, avenues and public places at one time, in one proceeding and by one commission over the plan of opening them singly, at different times and by different commissions.

Seventh.—Whereas it is demonstrated that to proceed by many and different proceedings is attended by the following disadvantages, to wit:

First: That the costs, expenses and advertising charges will be greatly increased, and be very unequal on different portions of the general area.

Second: That the surveys will necessarily be much more expensive.

Third: That there may be discordant decisions on the same questions of law and of title, arising from different locations.

Fourth: That it will be difficult to avoid conflicting boundaries, to areas of assessment of land benefited in distinct proceedings, at distant periods of time; and that these conflicts will work injustice to property owners.

Fifth: That there may be varying decisions as to the portion to be charged to the city on different streets and avenues which ought to be subjected to the same rule.

Sixth: That the review of these questions of law and of title arising in many distinct cases, and at different stages by the appellate courts, will involve delay in completing the improvements, and perhaps diversity of decisions.

Seventh: That there may fail to be uniformity in the many

questions necessarily left to the discretion of the different commissions.

Eighth: That the rise in the value of the property which will follow the progress and completion of the first improvement will increase the cost of the land taken in all the subsequent proceedings, thus increasing the burdens of the property owners.

Eighth.—And whereas it is demonstrated that to acquire title by one single proceding to all the streets, avenues, squares and public places, will be attended with the following advantages, to wit:

First: That the costs, charges and expenses will be greatly diminished, that one series of advertisements only will be needed, that fewer surveys and sets of maps will be required, that these will not duplicate or overrun each other, and can be prepared quickly and cheaply.

Second: That the decisions by one commission on all matters of discretion will be uniform.

Third: That the questions of law and of title, of whole or of partial dedication, of water rights, and of land under water, of valuation of equalization, and of the proportion to be charged on the city, &c., which arise throughout the whole region. will, by being considered in all their aspects at one time, be decided in relation to each other, and more justly.

Fourth: That the review of these questions, which will not be increased in number or in seriousness by the appellate court, will be facilitated.

Fifth: That a single commission of capable men can handle and decide all the questions that arise over the whole area with

a labor not greatly exceeding the labor they would expend in any single line of improvement, in which there would arise examples of each kind.

Sixth: That the work of the commission could, if diligently prosecuted, be completed for the whole area almost as soon as it could be on any one or two of the leading avenues.

Seventh: That great advantages would come to the public and to the property owners by this expedition in the proceeding, and simultaneousness and uniformity of consideration and decision on all the public questions of the case.

Eighth: That the cost to the city for that portion of the expenses which might be charged upon them would be greatly dimished if the land is all taken now, while values are low, and before they undergo any speculative advances.

Ninth: That the burden of the residue of the assessments on the property owners, who virtually pay for their own land, will be diminished if the land be taken at a present low scale of value, rather than a future high value.

Tenth.—That taking the whole land at one time, now and promptly, so that the whole is taken at a uniformly graded price, will work justice and equality to the property owners, and save them from the injustice and inequality which would result from taking land at the outset at present low prices, and in the end, at different grades of increased price, consequent in a great measure on the progress of the improvements themselves.

Eleventh.—That the present condition of the whole section of the island, its transition stage from farms and areas by the acre into villa and small suburban building lots; its great beauty and advantages of location and possibility of high future value,

shows that this is the right time to have these improvements carried out simultaneously and promptly and inexpensively.

Therefore resolved:

First.—That in the opinion of the Board it is most conducive to the public good, and that they deem it for the public interest, to acquire title for the use of the public to all the lands required for the streets and roads, and public squares and places laid out by it within that part of the City of New York to the northward of the southerly line of 155th street in one proceeding.

Second.—That the proceeding in the following cases:

Boulevard extension;

11th Avenue above 155th street;

Kingsbridge Road;

Dyckman, Nagle, Sherman and

10th Avenues;

10th Avenue extension;

185th street Cross street;

be discontinued.

Third.—That the counsel to the Corporation be, and he is hereby requested in each of the cases so discontinued, to prepare the bill of costs and expenses, and submit the same to this Board, in order that the same be adjusted and paid.

Fourth.—That all the records, minutes, maps, surveys, books, abstracts, reports, papers and property in the possession of the Commissioners, in each of the cases so discontinued, and all field notes, surveys and memorandum thereof made by direction of said Commissions or either of them, be delivered to this department.

Fifth.—That the subject of the commencement of one proceeding under the first resolution aforesaid, and the preparation of the petition, etc., therefor, be referred to the President of the Board.

COPY OF LETTER OF JOHN J. SERRELL, C. E.

NEW YORK, November 26, 1872.

Andrew H. Green, Esq., Vice-President, &c., Department of Public Parks:

Dear Sir:—I have examined the draft of the preamble and resolutions relative to opening all streets, avenues, &c., north of 155th street, by one Commission, and highly approve the plan indicated by such preamble and resolutions; but, before it is carried out, all the streets which the Board of Commissioners of Public Parks deem the public interests will require, should be surveyed and laid out and grades established for them, and maps filed according to law. There is yet several drainage and cross-connection streets to lay out, and the question of location of the Parade-Ground and exterior street on the Hudson River to settle, before final maps and grades can be made and filed, to enable one commission to commence work properly; but I am decidedly of opinion that the public interests will be best served by abandoning all existing proceedings for opening streets, &c., in the district in question, and suffering the necessary delay until the whole streets can be opened under one proceeding.

I have made a few pencil amendments in the preamble and resolutions submitted to me, and returned herewith, to which your attention is asked by

Resolved, That under and by virtue of the provisions of an act entitled "An Act relative to the improvement of certain portions of the counties of Westchester and New York, including provisions for communication between said counties, and for improving the navigation of the Harlem River and Spuvten Duyvil Creek," passed April 15th, 1871, the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks have devised and prepared a map or plan, embracing and showing such changes in the location, width, courses and windings of the streets, avenues and roads now laid out in the southerly part of the town of Kingsbridge (formerly the town of Yonkers) as in their opinion can be made with benefit to the property affected and to the public interest; and also the location, width, courses and windings of such streets, avenues, roads and public squares and places as in their opinion can be laid out or discontinued with like benefit, as provided in said act, the said changes in the location, width, courses and windings of the streets, roads and avenues now laid out, which, in their opinion, can be made with benefit to the property affected and to the public interest, and also the location, width, courses and windings of such streets, roads and avenues as in their opinion can be laid out with like benefit, are shown by red color and figures on the said map or plan herein referred to, dated New York, January, 27th, 1873, and signed by Wm. H. Grant, Civil and Topograpaical Engineer; and such streets, roads and avenues now

laid out, and parts of the same, as in their opinion can be discontinued with like benefit, are shown on said map or plan by black lines, exterior to the streets, roads and avenues shown by red color and figures; and the said public squares and places which in their opinion can be laid out with like benefit, are shown by green color on the said map or plan, the area of ground within which said streets, roads and avenues, and public squares and places are situated being shown and delineated on said map or plan by a dotted green line extending on the northerly and easterly side of said area from the Hudson River Railroad to Tibbet's Brook and Spuyten Duyvil Creek, and by the northerly bulkhead-line of Spuyten Duyvil Creek, from near the mouth of Tibbet's Brook to the Hudson River Railroad on the southerly side of said area, and by the Hudson River Railroad on the westerly side of said area; and that the President of said Board of Commissioners cause the said streets, avenues and roads, and public squares and places so devised and prepared, to be surveyed and designated by proper monuments, and also cause to be prepared and submit to this Board profiles and grades for the said streets, avenues and roads.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Blatchford, Wales—4.

Mr. Wales offered the following:

Resolved, That the Treasurer be, and he is hereby, authorized to procure one thousand additional copies of the Second Annual Report.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirma-

tive, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Blatchford, Wales—4.

The Treasurer reported to the Board that the bonds of the county of Westchester, to the amount of \$17,000 had been deposited with the Comptroller of New York city, in conformity with certificate issued under authority of Section 3, Chapter 534, Laws 187I, for repairing and maintaining Central Bridge across Harlem river, and that the proceeds of said bonds were in the hands of said Comptroller awaiting the action of the Board.

Whereupon Mr. Wales offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller of the city of New York be, and he is hereby requested to pay to the Department of Public Parks the proceeds of certain bonds of the county of Westchester, issued to the amount of \$17,000, and deposited with him by the Treasurer of said County, in conformity with certificate issued under authority of Section 3, Chapter 534, Laws 1871.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Blatchford, Wales—4.

On motion of the President, at eleven o'clock and twenty minutes, the Board adjourned.

Mr. Wales offered the following:

Resolved, That the Board of the Department of Public Parks approves the action of its President and Treasurer in executing a power of attorney on January 24, 1873, for the transfer of the Bonds of the County of Westchester, issued by the said county to the amount of seventeen thousand dollars (\$17,000) for its proportion of the expenses of repairing and maintaining Central Bridge, said bonds having been drawn to the order of said Department.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes-Messrs. Stebbins, Church Wales-3.

Mr. Church offered the following:

Resolved, "That the withdrawal of the sum of One hundred thousand dollars from the Third National Bank, in the City of New York, is hereby specifically authorized, from time to time, as said amount is at the credit of this Department in said Bank, to be applied to the payment of persons employed by this Department, and to the payment of such bills and claims against this Department as have been, or may hereafter be ordered paid by this Department."

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Wales—3.

The President offered the following:

Resolved, That the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to remit the amount of such bills as may be found correct for Plants purchased in Europe, the same to be audited at next meeting of the Board.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmtive, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Wales—3.

The President called up the series of preambles and resolutions presented at meeting held December 18, 1872 (see pages 607 to 613, minutes), and moved their adoption as follows:

First.—Whereas, that portion of the city of New York, lying northward of 155th street, was not laid out under the Law of 1807, except by extending the Tenth avenue through the same, but has been recently laid out under subsequent legislation by the Commissioners of the Central Park.

Second.—Whereas, the natural surface of the land, its differences of elavation, its billsides and declivities, have required a plan different from the rectangular system of parallel streets and avenues adopted below 155th street, and more nearly conforming to the natural surface, so that the blocks between the streets vary greatly in size and in shape, and are many of them bounded by diagonal and curved lines.

Third.—Whereas, the whole of the aforesaid portion of the city aforesaid has been thoroughly surveyed, and the maps thereof, laying out the streets, roads, avenues and public places thereon, have been made, and many of them duly filed, and the remainder will be filed in a short time.

Fourth.—Whereas, the public interests and those of the property owners require that these streets and avenues not already opened should now be opened, and the title thereof be acquired by the city, so that this section of the city may be ready for the improvements pressing in upon it.

Fifth.—Whereas, in a few cases, proceedings have been commenced for the opening of some of these streets, in some cases for a single street in each proceeding, and in others for a group of streets in one proceeding.

Sixth.—Whereas, these proceedings have been carried far enough to show the contrast between the results to be attained by opening all these streets, roads, avenues and public places at one time, in one proceeding and by one commission over the plan of opening them singly, at different times and by different commissions.

Seventh.—Whereas, it is demonstrated that to proceed by many and different proceedings is attended by the following disadvantages, to wit:

First: That the costs, expenses and advertising charges will be greatly increased, and be very unequal on different portions of the general area.

Second: That the surveys will necessarily be much more expensive.

Third: That there may be discordant decisions on the same questions of law and of title, arising from different locations.

Fourth: That it will be difficult to avoid conflicting boundaries to areas of assessment of land benefited in distinct proceedings, at distant periods of time; and that these conflicts will work injustice to property owners.

Fifth: That there may be varying decisions as to the proportions to be charged to the city on different streets and avenues which ought to be subjected to the same rule.

Sixth: That the review of these questions of law and of title arising in many distinct cases, and at different stages by the appellate courts, will involve delay in completing the improvements, and perhaps diversity of decisions.

Seventh: That there may fail to be uniformity in the many questions necessarily left to the discretion of the different commissions.

Eighth: That the rise in the value of the property which will follow the progress and completion of the first improvement will increase the cost of the land taken in all the subsequent proceedings, thus increasing the burdens of the property owners.

Eighth.—And whereas it is demonstrated that to acquire title

by one single proceeding to all the streets, avenues, squares and public places, will be attended with the following advantages, to wit:

First: That the costs, charges and expenses will be greatly diminished, that one series of advertisements only will be needed, that fewer surveys and sets of maps will be required, that these will not duplicate or overrun each other, and can be prepared quickly and cheaply.

Second: That the decisions by one commission on all matters of discretion will be uniform.

Third: That the questions of law and of title, of whole or of partial dedication, of water rights, and of land under water, of valuation, of equalization, and of the proportion to be charged on the city, &c., which arise throughout the whole region, will, by being considered in all their aspects at one time, be decided in relation to each other, and more justly.

Fourth: That the review of these questions, which will not be increased in number or inseriousness by the appellate court, will be facilitated.

Fifth: That a single commission of capable men can handle and decide all the questions that arise over the whole area with a labor not greatly exceeding the labor they would expend in any single line of improvement, in which there would arise examples of each kind.

Sixth: That the work of the commission could, if diligently prosecuted, be completed for the whole area almost as soon as it could be on any one or two of the leading avenues.

Seventh: That great advantages would come to the public

and to the property owners by this expedition in the proceeding, and simultaneousness and uniformity of consideration and decision on all the public questions of the case.

Eighth: That the cost to the city for that portion of the expenses which might be charged upon them would be greatly diminished if the land is all taken now, while values are low, and before they undergo any speculative advances.

Ninth: That the burden of the residue of the assessments on the property owners, who virtually pay for their own land, will be diminished if the land be taken at a present low scale of value, rather than a future high value.

Tenth.—That taking the whole land at one time, now and promptly, so that the whole is taken at a uniformly graded price, will work justice and equality to the property owners, and save them from the injustice and inequality which would result from taking land at the outset at present low prices, and in the end, at different grades of increased price, consequent in a great measure on the progress of the improvements themselves.

Eleventh.—That the present condition of the whole section of the island, its transition stage from farms and areas by the acre into villa and small suburban building lots; its great beauty and advantages of location and possibility of high future value, shows that this is the right time to have these improvements carried out simultaneously and promptly and inexpensively.

#### Therefore resolved:

First.—That in the opinion of the Board it is most conducive to the public good, and that they deem it for the public interest,

to acquire title for the use of the public to all the lands required for the streets and roads, and public squares and places laid out by it within that part of the city of New York to the northward of the southerly line of 155th street in one proceeding.

Second.—That the proceedings in the following cases:

Laying out a road or public drive northwardly from the southerly line of 155th street, in the city of New York, to the intersection of the Kingsbridge road, with a street known and designated on the map of the Department of Public Parks, as Inwood street, as laid out by resolution of the Commissioners of the Central Park.

Widening and straightening Kingsbridge road northerly, from the southerly line of 155th street to the Harlem River, as laid out by the Commissioners of the Central Park, in the city of New York.

Opening Eleventh avenue northwardly, from the northerly line of the road or Public Drive, to the southerly line of the street leading from Kingsbridge road, near Inwood street, to the Harlem river, near Sherman's Creek, in the city of New York.

Opening Tenth avenue from a point 10,353 feet six inches northerly from the southerly side of 155th street, in a north-westerly, westerly, and south-westerly direction to the Eleventh avenue, as laid out by resolution of the Commissioners of the Central Park, in the city of New York.

Laying out of certain new streets and avenues, north of 155th street, as the same were laid out by resolution of the Commissioners of the Central Park, in the city of New York.

Laying out, a new street, running parallel to 155th street, in

an easterly direction from the Kingsbridge road, across the Tenth avenue to the Boulevard, near the Harlem river, as laid out by resolution of the Commissioners of the Central Park, in the city of New York,

be discontinued as rapidly as will be consistent with the public interest.

Third.—That the Counsel to the Corporation be, and he is hereby requested in each of the cases so discontinued, to prepare the bill of costs and expenses, and submit the same to this Board, in order that the same be adjusted and paid.

Fourth.—That all the records, minutes, maps, surveys, books, abstracts, reports, papers and property in the possession of the Commissioners, in each of the cases so discontinued, and all field-notes, surveys and memorandum thereof made by direction of said Commissions, or either of them, be delivered to this department.

Fifth.—That the subject of the commencement of one proceeding under the first resolution aforesaid, and the preparation of the petition, etc., therefor, be referred to the President of the Board.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolutions, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Wales—3.

The President laid before the Board a petition from S. E. Mauran and others, owners of property at Inwood, requesting that a portion of a street be laid out to complete the connection of Inwood street with Bolton road, and in continuation of Prescott avenue, as shown on map accompanying petition.

Referred to the Engineer.

H. Grant, civil and topographical engineer; the widths, locations, courses, windings, extent and direction of the said streets and roads so laid down on said map, seeming to said Board of Commissioners most conducive to public good, and that the lands colored red on said map are those required for the said streets and roads laid out as aforesaid, and that the President of said Board of Commissioners cause the said streets and roads, so laid out as aforesaid, to be surveyed and designated by proper monuments, and also cause to be prepared and submit to this Board profiles and grades for the said streets and roads so laid out.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said motion, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Resolved, That the President be, and he is hereby, instructed to protest, on behalf of this Department, against the appropriation of Reservoir square for an armory.

President Board of Commissioners:

Sir:

Sergeant Martin R. Beam, of the keepers' service, was appointed on the City Watch in 1842, and served the City, with

credit, in that capacity, and as Municipal Policeman, successively, under the administrations of Mayors Havemeyer, Woodhull and Kingsland, and until the municipal police force was abolished in 1857.

In January, 1860, he was appointed a Keeper of the Central Park, and twelve months afterwards, solely on account of the evidence of fitness displayed in that capacity, was promoted to the office of Sergeant. Since then, under all the changes of administration of the Park, he has so far commanded the respect of his superiors as to be retained uninterruptedly in that office, fully sustaining the expectations which originally led to his promotion.

He is now sixty-three years old, and I am advised by the Surgeon that he is disqualified by his age to meet the requirements necessary to be made upon the force in general.

In view of the above facts. I recommend that the Board direct the honorable discharge of Sergeant Beam, that it express by resolution its respect for his character, and the estimates it places upon his services, and that as a further token thereof the Treasurer be directed to add a certain sum to the wages which shall be due him upon his retirement.

Lane, Rader, Martin and others in favor of the easterly line, and by Messrs. Carter, O'Conor, Diggs and others favoring the westerly line.

In view of the results of the above mentioned conference, as well as of information previously obtained, the resolutions offered by the President at the last meeting, and made the special order for this meeting, ordering the filing of the maps of the Fort Washington Ridge Road as laid out with a change to the east from the original design, were, on motion of Mr. Wales, taken up, and their adoption moved by him, as follows:

Resolved, That under and by virtue of the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of New York, entitled "An Act to provide for the laying out and improving of certain portions of the City and County of New York," passed April 24, 1865, the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks have caused three similar maps or surveys to be made, entitled "Map or Survey showing streets and roads that have been laid out by the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks within that part of the city of New York to the northward of the southerly line of 155th street, in pursuance of an Act entitled 'An Act to provide for the laying out and improving of certain portions of the City and County of New York,' passed April 24, 1865, dated New York, February 18, 1873," and signed W. H. Grant, Civil and Topographi-

cal Engineer, showing streets and roads which have been laid out under said Act.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks deem that the public interests require that the aforesaid three similar maps or surveys be filed in the manner provided by said Act, and hereby direct that said maps be so filed.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolutions, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting infavor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Wales—3.

From the Landscape Architect, relative to Riverside Park recommending that that portion of the line of Twelfth Avenue, cutting the north-westerly part of said park, be diverged, and suggesting Legislative action thereon.

Whereupon, Mr. Wales offered the following:

Resolved, That the communication of the Landscape Architect in relation to Riverside Park be accepted and placed on file, and a committee be appointed by the President to memorialize the Legislature in furtherance of the views contained in said communication.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Wales—3.

The President thereupon appointed Mr. Church and Mr. Wales such committee.

The TREASURER submitted proof sheets of draft of proposed revised ordinances for Central Park, and also attached thereto proof sheets of rules and regulations relative to the police force.

Whereupon, Mr. Wales offered the following:

Resolved. That the ordinances for the regulations, use and government of the Central Park, as presented this day, be, and they are hereby, adopted, and that the Treasurer is hereby directed to cause the immediate publication of the same for ten days in the Times, Evening Post and Tribune, published in the city of New York, and said newspapers are selected by the Board for that purpose.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Wales—3.

Mr. Wales offered the following:

Resolved, That the matter of the proof sheets before the Board, from page 2 to the end, be printed as a document of the Board.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Wales—3.

See Doc. 43.

From the Landscape Architect, relative to work on Eighth avenue wall of Central Park.

Whereupon, Mr. Church offered the following:

Resolved, That the Treasurer be instructed to invite proposals for building six thousand (6,000) feet of parapet wall on Eighth avenue, in accordance with the plans and specifications of the Landscape Architect, and to arrange a contract as soon as possible, subject to the approval of the Board.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Wales—3.

The President submitted map of Sedgwick avenue.

Referred to the Treasurer, to obtain the views of the property owners thereon.

From W. H. Grant, relative to defects in one of the supporting cylinders of Harlem Bridge.

Referred to the Treasurer, to report thereon to the Board.

The Landscape Architect reported that in the matter of a communication to the Department from the Street Cleaning Bureau, referred to him at the last meeting, he had replied that it was not desirable that street dirt should at this time be deposited on the smaller parks of the city.

On motion of Mr. Church, at three o'clock and thirty minutes, the Board adjourned.

The PRESIDENT put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting infavor thereof, as follows:

From W. H. Grant, enclosing statement of bills for traveling expenses of men under his direction, and requesting the action of the Board thereon.

Grant, and all persons in the employ of this Department under his direction, engaged directly or indirectly on work in Westchester County or upon work connected with the improvement of Harlem River and Spuyten Duyvel Creek, that the Department has no funds to pay for any further services; and if they continue upon said work, to direct the said Wm. H. Grant to obtain from every such person a written agreement to waive all claims for such service until the Department has funds to the credit of said works, which, with its present information, will not be the case for an indefinite period, possibly for more than a year.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the Members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Wales—3.

The President submitted map of location and grade of Sedgwick avenue, Westchester county, and moved the following:

Resolved, That under and by virtue of the provisions of an act, entitled "An Act relative to the improvement of certain portions of the counties of Westchester and New York, including provisions for communication between said counties, and for improving the navigation of the Harlem river and Spuyten Duyvel creek," passed April 15th, 1871, the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks have devised and prepared a map, or plan and profile, embracing and showing such changes in the location, width, courses and windings and grades of the streets, avenues and roads now laid out in the south-westerly part of the town of West Farms as, in their opinion, can be made with benefit to the property affected, and to the public interest; and, also the location, width, courses and

windings and grades of such streets, avenues, roads and public squares and places, as in their opinion, can be laid out or discontinued with like benefit, as provided in said act, the said changes in the location, width, courses and windings and grades of the streets, roads and avenues now laid out which, in their opinion, can be made with benefit to the property affected, and to the public interest; and, also, the locations, widths, courses and windings and grades of such streets, roads and avenues as in their opinion, can be laid out with like benefit, are shown by red lines, color and figures on the said map, or plan and profile herein referred to, dated New York, March 29th, 1873, and signed by William H. Grant, civil and topographical engineer; and such streets, roads and avenues now laid out, and parts of the same as, in their opinion, can be discontinued with like benefit, are shown on said map or plan by black lines and India ink shading exterior to the streets, roads and avenues shown by red color and figures, and the said public squares and places which, in their opinion, can be laid out with like benefit, are shown by green color on the said map or plan.

Resolved, That the President of said Board of Commissioners is hereby authorized to cause to be prepared for filing, in accordance with the provisions of the above-mentioned Act, maps, plans, profiles and locations of said streets, roads, avenues, public squares and places, and submit the same to this Board.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolutions, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in tavor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Wales—3.

A communication was received, through Mr. Bergh, Pres. A. S. P. C. A., complaining of cruelty resulting from certain arrangements in the Menagerie.

The Treasurer laid before the Board certified copy of resolution passed at a town-meeting of the town of Kingsbridge, held March 26, 1873, authorizing the Supervisor and Town Clerk of said town to issue bonds in pursuance of Chap. 89, Laws 1873, for the improvement of said town upon requisitions of this Board; whereupon

Mr. Church offered the following:

Resolved, That the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, hereby makes requuisition on the Supervisor and Town Clerk of the town of Kingsbridge, county of Westchester, for the issuing and delivery to it of the bonds of said town to the amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), the said sum being required by said Board of Commissioners to carry out the provisions of Chap. 89, Laws 1873.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Wales—3.

From James Brady, making application for lease of High Bridge Hotel.

Referred to the Treasurer, with power.

The TREASURER stated to the Board that through an error in transcribing minutes of March 10th, the action of the Board on salary of John Bogart was omitted from the printed minutes; whereupon,

Mr. Wales moved that the Treasurer be authorized to reprint minutes of March 10, embodying therein the action of the Board on salary of John Bogart, engineer.

The PRESIDENT put the question whether the Board would agree to said motion, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

A communication were received from Owen Murphy, withdrawing his former proposal, and offering increased amount for lease of High Bridge Hotel.

Referred to the Treasurer.

At this stage of the proceedings Mr. Stebbins appeared and took his seat.

Mr. Wales offered the following:

Resolved, That a Special Committee be appointed by the President to examine and report to this Board as to whether it may not be possible to retrench the expenses of the Department of Public Parks without detriment to the public service.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the Members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes.—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Blatchford, Wales—4.

The President thereupon appointed Mr. Wales such Committee.

The following communications were received.

From W. H. Grant, reporting progress made by Mr. Serrell and himself in the matter of proposed Map of Streets, &c., in town of Kingsbridge, referred to them by the Board, March 10, p. 698 of minutes.

Laid on the table.

From W. H. Grant, with map and profile of new street, in continuation of street, termed "F" street, and connecting Inwood street with Bolton Road, as directed, March 22, p. 712 of the minutes.

Whereupon Mr. Wales moved the following:

Resolved, That under and by virtue of the provisions of an Act entitled "An Act to provide for the laying out and improving of certain portions of the City and County of New York," passed April 24, 1865, the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks hereby lay the street or road fifty feet wide, in continuation northerly from a street known as "F" street, the southerly end of said street hereby laid out, being  $281_{\frac{9}{100}}$  feet from the northerly side of Inwood street, as measured on the centre-line of said "F" street, and extending northerly from "F" street 299 08 feet to or near the southerly side of street or road known as Bolton Road, said street hereby laid out being shown by red color and figures on a map entitled "Map and profile of the extension of a street known as "F" street to a point in a street known as Bolton avenue, opposite to another street known as Prescott avenue," dated "New York, April 14, 1873," and signed "Wm. H. Grant, Civil and Topographical Engineer."

And the said Board of Commissioners do hereby lay out and establish the grade of said street above laid out, and also the grade of "F" street, of which said new street is a continuation, as the same is shown by red lines and figures on the aforesaid map and profile, dated "New York, April 14, 1873," and signed "Wm. H. Grant, Civil and Topographical Engineer."

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the Members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Blatchford, Wales—4.

From W. H. Grant, with two sketches, marked A and B, respectively, showing discrepancy between the adopted Map of

Streets north of Inwood street and the streets as laid out on the ground, so far as the property of F. G. Green and D. C. and J. Hays is affected.

On motion of Mr. Wales:

Laid on the table, for further information from the Engineer.

From W. H. Grant, Engineer, objecting to plan and estimate of cost of proposed tunnel under Harlem river, prepared by G. S. Greene, Consulting Engineer, under the direction of the Board, and recommending immediate prosecution of certain work preparatory to building said tunnel.

The President suggested that a copy of said communication be transmitted to G. S. Greene, Consulting Engineer, to examine and report thereon to the Board.

Mr. Wales moved that said communication from W. H. Grant, just submitted, be referred to the President, and that he be authorized to carry out his own suggestion.

Adopted.

From Emmons Clark, Col. Com. 7th Reg., N. G., S. N. Y., enclosing design for base of 7th Regiment statue, and proposed inscriptions upon the same.

Mr. Wales moved that said communication from Col. Clark be referred to the Landscape Architect and Consulting Landscape Architect, with power.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said motion, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

From A. Dumahaut, resigning his position of Property-Clerk to the Department.

On motion of Mr. Wales, Accepted, to take effect May 1st, 1873.

From the Landscape Architect, making report on the carriage service on Central Park, as requested January 15, p. 627 of the minutes, recommending an extension of license to Platt and Clapp, and submitting draft of an order for the regulation of said service, to which they will be required to conform.

## Mr. Wales offered the following:

Resolved, That the report of the Landscape Architect upon the application of Messrs. Platt & Clapp for an extension of their carriage license, be accepted and his action approved, and that the Board will extend their present license for a period of five years from the fourteenth day of February, 1873, provided Messrs. Platt & Clapp accept the terms proposed in the draft of an order submitted in the report.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

From the Landscape Architect, presenting report of Director of Menagerie for the month of March, 1873.

Ordered filed.

Mr. Wales offered the following:

Resolved, That under and by virtue of the provisions of Chapter 534 of the Laws of the State of New York, passed April 15th, 1871, the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York, have devised and prepared a map or plan embracing and showing such changes in the location, width, courses and windings of the streets, avenues and roads now laid out as, in their opinion, can be made with benefit to the property affected, and to the public interest; and also the locations, widths, courses and windings of such streets, avenues, roads and public squares and places as, in their opinion, can be laid out, retained or discontinued with like benefit, within that particular section of the district or area described in Sec. 1 of said Chap. 534, which is situated in the county of Westchester, and town of West Farms, the streets, avenues and roads laid out and established being indicated by red color lines and figures, the portions of streets, avenues and roads retained are colored red between black lines; the portions of streets, avenues and roads discontinued, by a shading of India ink between black lines, and the public squares and places laid out, by green color, on duplicate maps or plans of streets, avenues, roads and public squares or places respectively, entitled:

"A map or plan showing such changes in the location, width, courses and windings of the streets, avenues and roads now laid out as, in the opinion of the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York, can be made with benefit to the property affected, and to the public interest; and also the location, width, courses and windings of such streets, avenues and roads, and public squares and places as, in their opinion, can be laid out or discontinued with like benefit, within that particular section of the district or area described in the first section of Chapter 534 of the Laws of the State of New York, passed April 15th, 1871, and in the first section of Chapter 878 of the Laws of the State of New York, passed June 8th, 1872, which particular section is situated in the town of West Farms, and is bounded as shown on the said map or plan, by broken blue lines drawn thereon."

And said map or plan being dated "New York, April 14th, 1873," and signed by "Wm. H. Grant, Civil and Topographical Engineer." And said Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, do hereby discontinue, lay out, retain and establish the several streets, avenues, roads and public

squares or places, as the same are shown, with such field notes and explanations as the said Board of Commissioners deems expedient, on the aforesaid duplicate maps or plans, dated New York, April 14th, 1873, and signed by "Wm. H. Grant, Civil and Topographical Engineer."

Resolved, That under and by virtue of the provisions of Chap. 534 of the laws of the State of New York, passed April 15th, 1871, the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York, have devised and prepared a plan or profile embracing and showing such changes in the grades of the streets, avenues and roads now discontinued, laid out and established as, in their opinion, can be made with benefit to the property affected, and to the public interest, within that particular section of the district or area described in Sec. 1 of said Chapter 534, which is situated in the county of Westchester, and town of West Farms; said grades which are laid out and established are shown by red lines, and said grades which are discontinued are designated by black lines and shading of India ink under said lines on two duplicate plans entitled:

"Plan or profiles showing the grades laid out and established, and the grades discontinued for streets, avenues and roads in the town of West Farms and county of West Chester, shown on the map or plan of said streets, avenues and roads, entitled 'A Map or Plan showing such changes in the location, width, courses and windings of the streets, avenues and roads now laid out as, in the opinion of the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York, can be made with benefit to the property affected and to the public interest; and also the location, width, courses and windings of such streets, avenues and roads, and public squares and places, as in their opinion can be laid out or discontinued with like benefit, within that particular section of the district or area described in the first section of Chapter 534 of the Laws of the State of New York, passed April 5th, 1871, and in the first section of Chapter 878 of the Laws of the State of New York, passed June 8th, 1872, which particular section is situated in the town of West Farms, and is bounded, as shown on the said map or plan, by broken blue lines drawn thereon, dated New York, April 14th, 1873, and signed by Wm. H. Grant, Civil and Topographical Engineer."

And said Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks do hereby discontinue and establish the several grades of the several streets, avenues and roads, as the same are shown with such field-notes and explanations as the said Board of Commissioners deem expedient on the aforesaid two duplicates plans or profiles, dated "New York, April 14th, 1873," and signed "Wm. H. Grant, Civil and Topographical Engineer."

Resolved, That the said Board of Commissioners deem it proper to file the aforesaid duplicate sets of maps or plans and profiles, and hereby authorize and request the President, as chief officer of the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, to certify and cause to be filed, in the manner provided by said Chapter 534, Laws 1871, the aforesaid duplicate sets of maps, plans and profiles.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolutions, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Messrs. Stebbins, Church, Blatchford, Wales—4.

On motion of Mr. Wales, at three o'clock and forty-five minutes the Board adjourned.
