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## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Monday, May 4, 1896-Regular Meeting, 2 p.m.

S. Van Rensselaer Cruger, having been reappointed a Commissioner of Public Parks, presented his certificate of appointment, which was read, as follows:

CITY OF NEW YORK, OFFICE OF THE MAYOR.

Know all men by these presents, that under and by virtue of the authority of the statutes in such case made and provided, I do hereby appoint S. Van Rensselaer Cruger a Park Commissioner in the City of New York to succeed himself for the full term of five years.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal of office this fourth day of May, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six.

Present-Commissioners Cruger (President), Stiles, Ely.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The following communications were received:

From the Secretary of the Department of Docks, forwarding a map showing platform or boatlanding at the Battery with the proposed extension of the same. Filed.

From the President of the New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children in relation to the disposition of cases of arrests of juveniles in the parks. Referred to the Committee on Police.

From the Secretary of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, transmitting an extract from the minutes of the Board of Trustees respecting the sanitary condition of the cellar of the first wing of the Museum building. Referred to the Engineer of Construction.

From the Secretary of the American Museum of Natural History, in relation to the need for closing the Museum building evenings while the work of installing the new electric-lighting plant is in progress. Approved.

From John D. Terry and others, requesting that Foreman McChristie be returned to duty at East River Park. Filed.

From Samuel Sanders, commending Officer No. 290 of the Park Police for stopping a runaway horse in the Park on the 28th ultimo. Referred to the Committee on Police.

From the Upper East Side Association, calling attention to the condition of the entrances to Central Park at One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Tenth streets and Fifth avenue, and complaining of the spreading of sand on the avenue. Referred to the Secretary to reply.

From the Kingsbridge Improvement Association, suggesting that the swamp land south of the road leading from Broadway to Van Cortlandt Station be dredged and made into a lake. Filed.

From Willis Holly, requesting permission for Nathan Straus to establish depots for the sale of sterilized milk in the parks. Referred to Superintendent of Parks for report.

From the "Evening Telegram," requesting permission for a bicycle parade on Riverside Drive on the afternoon of Saturday, June 6. Referred to the President with power.

From Wood & Tolmie, requesting an extension of time to June 1, 1896, for the completion of their contract for constructing an overlook, etc., in Corlears Hook Park. Granted.

From John Slattery, applying for an extension of time on his contract for the improvement of Mulberry Bend Park.

On motion, the time for the completion of the work under said contract was extended to June 1, 1896.

From the Kit Kat Club, applying for permission to encamp on Pelham Bay Park during a part of the coming summer. Referred to the Superintendent of Parks.

From Thomas L. Moore, applying for employment as an Assistant Engineer. Filed.

From the Captain of Police:

- 1st. Reporting a list of accidents, injuries, etc., in the parks during the week ending May 2. Filed.
- 2d. Reporting the refusal of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children to accept juvenile prisoners from the parks. Filed.

From the Engineer of Construction, reporting upon the condition of "The Pool" in Central Park, with recommendations for its treatment.

On motion, the recommendations of the Engineer were approved and ordered carried out as speedily as possible.

From Ernest A. Lewald, Draughtsman, applying for leave of absence without pay until such time as work on the Harlem River Driveway is actively resumed. Granted.

From Sergeant James B. Ferris, applying for full pay allowance for time lost on account of an injury received. Referred to the Committee on Police.

From Park Policemen John W. Willson and Thomas A. Howard, asking permission to receive prizes awarded them at the horse show at Durland's Riding Academy. Granted.

From Sergeant Hugh Fitzpatrick, applying for leave of absence for the veteran members of the police force on 30th instant to enable them to participate in the exercises of Memorial Day. Referred to the Committee on Police.

From the Engineer of Construction, explaining the necessity for laying water-pipes at the depth recommended by him and shown on plans submitted on the 20th ultimo.

On motion, the Engineer's recommendation was adopted and the pipes ordered laid at the depth stated, twelve inches.

The President, from the Committee on Police, reported verbally in the matter of the annual parade and review of the Park Police, recommending that Thursday, May 14, at 10 A. M., be fixed as the time therefor, and that the Mayor be invited to review the same. Adopted.

The President reported that he had been in communication during the past month with Austin Corbin, in reference to his proposition to loan a portion of his herd of buffalo to the Department, and recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Department of Public Parks accepts with pleasure the offer of Mr. Austin Corbin to place in one of the parks north of the Harlem river from thirty to fifty of his herd of buffalo, and that they be placed there upon the following terms:

- 1st. This Department will fence in a tract of land of about 150 acres in Van Cortlandt Park, to be designated by the President, at a cost not to exceed \$950.
- 2d. Mr. Corbin is to deliver about 30 buffalo in the inclosure, at his own expense, as soon as the fence is completed, the balance to be delivered next autumn.
- 3d. Mr. Corbin is to furnish, at his own expense, such attendants as he may deem necessary to properly look after the herd.
  - 4th. This Department will furnish the necessary forage to feed the herd.
  - 5th. This Department may place in the inclosure such number of deer or elk as it pleases.
- 6th. It is agreed that 25 per cent. of the annual increase of the herd of buffalo shall belong to the Department, but in case any of the herd die while in transit from Vermont, such number shall be deducted from the annual increase.
- 7th. Mr. Corbin retains the right to remove his herd upon giving 9 months' notice in writing, and this Department retains the right to direct their removal upon giving similar notice.
- 8th. Mr. Corbin may remove his portion of the annual increase, provided, however, that the herd shall not be reduced below fifty (50).

9th. The Counsel to the Corporation to prepare the necessary agreement between Mr. Corbin and this Department.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes-Commissioners Cruger, Stiles, Ely-3.

The President laid before the Board a communication from Messrs. Garland, Smith and Wales, the Building Committee of the Board of Trustees of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, with reference to the selection of an architect for the proposed new wing of the Museum building, and moved that the resolution adopted on 14th ultimo in relation to that matter be amended so as to read as follows:

Resolved, 1st, That R.H. Hunt should be named as the Architect of the new wing of the Metropolitan Museum of Art; 2d, That George B. Post should be named as Consulting Architect and Engineer, with the understanding that his services as such Consulting Architect and Engineer shall be at the disposal of Mr. Hunt, the Building Committee of said Museum and the Park Commissioners.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes-Commissioners Cruger, Stiles, Ely-3.

On motion, the pay of John H. Beatty, Stenographer, was fixed at \$125 per month, to date from 16th instant, by the following vote:

A representative of the Comptroller being present and the meeting open to the public, the President opened the estimate boxes and publicly opened and read all the estimates or proposals which had been received on the 6th instant for furnishing and delivering sod and also those received this day for furnishing park settees, pursuant to advertisements duly published in the CITY RECORD.

Commissioner Stiles moved that Commissioner Cruger be elected President of the Board, to serve until November 1, 1896.

The following communications were received:

From the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a copy of a resolution providing for the issue of bonds to the amount of \$1,500, under chapter 986, Laws of 1895, to meet the expense of preliminary work for the proposed temporary bridge over Harlem river at One Hundred and Forty-fifth street. Filed.

From the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, requesting to be furnished with maps, for filing, laying-out parks in the Twentieth and Eleventh Wards. Referred to the Engineer of Construction for compliance.

From the Secretary of the National Sculpture Society, in relation to reports to be made upon park statuary. Filed.

From the Board of Health, referring to this Department a complaint made in relation to the "Pool" in Central Park,

Commissioner McMillan moved that a special committee be appointed to take action on the complaint from the Board of Health on the condition of the "Pool." Which was carried.

The President appointed Commissioners McMillan and Stiles as such committee.

From the Ladies' Health Protective Association, in relation to the hour for closing the ladies' cottages in the parks during the summer season. Referred to the Superintendent of Parks for report.

From the Secretary of the Fairmount Improvement Association, in relation to the condition of a drain in the northerly part of Crotona Park, and also asking that that park be included among the parks in which concerts are to be given during the coming season.

On motion, the subject of music was referred to the President, and the matter of the drain was referred to the Superintendent of Parks.

From Rev. C. A. Daniel, favoring the suggestion for providing sand hills in the parks for children. Referred to the Superintendent of Parks to procure and submit estimates for furnishing the sand required for that purpose.

From the Northern Gas-light Company, reporting damage done to lamps along roads in Bronx Park. Referred to the Committee on Police.

From the Columbia Yacht Club, applying for permission to erect an iron foot-bridge over the railroad tracks opposite their club-house at Eighty-sixth street and Hudson river, Riverside Park. Referred to the President for report.

From John Brisben Walker, submitting a copy of "Regulations for the Cosmopolitan Horseless Carriage Contest," to take place on 30th instant, proposing to pass through the Central Park.

On motion, the proposed route to be taken was approved as to the use of City Hall Park, but disapproved as to the use of the Central Park.

From McBride & Thompson, applying for permission to erect bay-windows on two proposed apartment-houses on the south side of One Hundred and Twenty-third street, 200 feet west of Tenth avenue. Referred to Commissioner McMillan.

From John H. Judge, requesting the restoration of the steps formerly used for access to the Central Park, at West Ninety-second street. Referred to the Superintendent of Parks for report.

From E. M. Van Buren, commending Officer William Flynn for stopping a runaway horse in the Park. Referred to the Committee on Police.

From the Hydraulic Construction Company, desiring to bid on proposed bridge work at One Hundred and Forty-fifth street and Harlem river. Filed.

- From F. V. Smith, applying for an indefinite extension of time on his contract for the improvement of Cathedral Parkway. Referred to Commissioner McMillan and the Engineer of Construction for report.
  - From J.C. Stines and F.W. Salmonson, applying for the privilege of establishing and operating carrousel and swings in Mount Morris Park. Referred to the Superintendent of Parks for report.

From the Assistant Secretary, reporting relative to auction sales of impounded animals and condemned property on the 2d and 5th instants. Filed.

From the Engineer of Construction, submitting plan and specifications for altering the curbstones and roadway at corners and paving exterior sidewalks of Mount Morris Park.

On motion, the plans and specifications submitted by the Engineer were approved and the specifications ordered printed.

Commissioner Cruger offered the following:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be respectfully requested to designate Mount Morris Park as one of the parks to be improved under the provisions of chapter 194 of the Laws of 1896, and also to authorize the issue of bonds to the amount of ten thousand five hundred dollars, in the manner provided by said act, for the purpose of defraying the expense of making alterations to curbstones and roadway at corners and paving exterior sidewalks of Mount Morris Park, as shown on the plan this day submitted by the Engineer of Construction and approved.

From the Captain of Police, reporting a list of accidents, injuries, etc., in the parks for the week ending May 2. Filed.

From the Captain of Police, reporting a horse as unfit for police service. Filed.

From Youngs, Bergeson & Cornell, applying for permission to erect projections on the building No. 41 Union Square. Referred to Commissioner McMillan.

A certified copy of chapter 194, Laws of 1896, An act "to provide for the improvement of Parks, Parkways and Drives in the City of New York" was received and placed on file.

From the Superintendent of Parks:

Ist. Reporting in relation to an application for permission to establish depots for the sale of sterilized milk in the parks, and recommending that such depots be permitted on Battery, City Hall, Tompkins and Paradise Parks.

On motion, permission was granted to establish the milk depots on said parks, at points to be selected by the Superintendent.

2d. Reporting favorably upon the application of the Kit-Cat Club for permission to encamp in Pelham Bay Park.

On motion, the application was ordered granted.

Mrs. Townsend, of the Society of Colonial Dames of the State of New York, appeared before the Board, and was heard in relation to obtaining a license for the occupation of the Manor House, in Van Cortlandt Park, for a period longer than one year.

Commissioner McMillan moved that a special committee of two be appointed to take into immediate consideration the improvement of Cedar and St. Mary's Parks. Carried.

The President appointed Commissioners McMillan and Stiles as such committee.

Messrs. Charles L. Guy, Charles Hilton Brown and others, representing owners of property north of Harlem river, appeared and requested that the structure of the temporary Macomb's Dam bridge be left in its present position and put in condition to be used for railway purposes, temporarily, until other facilities are provided for the purpose.

Mr. Brown filed a memorandum of the matter.

Elbridge T. Gerry appeared on behalf of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, and requested permission for a wagon of that society to enter and pass through Central Park during the summer months, for the purpose of giving outings to the children.

On motion, permission was granted as applied for, to continue during the pleasure of the Board.

Commissioner Cruger offered the following:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be respectfully requested to transfer the sum of thirty-three dollars and sixty-nine cents from the unexpended balance of the appropriation for "Zoological Department" for the year 1895, for which it will not be required, to the appropriation for "Police—Salaries," for the same year, which is insufficient.

Commissioner Stiles offered the following:

Resolved, That the bill of Robert Hall, amounting to eighteen dollars (\$18), for carriage hire on 24th ultimo in visiting new parks, be and the same hereby is approved, audited and ordered transmitted to the Finance Department for payment, chargeable against the appropriation for "Maintenance, etc., of New Parks North of Harlem River," for the year 1896.

On motion of Commissioner McMillan, it was

Resolved, That the Trustees and Architect of the American Museum of Natural History report to this Board, as soon as possible, the cause of the delay in building the annex to the same.

Resolved, That the Engineers of this Department be instructed to prepare plans and specifications for the laying of asphalt or concrete walks around Mount Morris Park.

On motion of Commissioner McMillan, it was

Resolved, That the work on the first section of Riverside Drive, at Seventy-ninth street, is not in accordance with the specifications for the contract of said work, and that the Engineers of this Department report on the same to this Board and notify the contractor at once.

Commissioner McMillan offered the following:

Resolved, That all requisitions or orders for the expenditure of any money in this Department, exceeding the sum of three hundred dollars, be made a Board subject, or that three members of the Board sign the same.

From the Mayor, urging economy in the preparation of the Departmental Estimate for the coming year. Referred to the President.

From the Comptroller, requesting that the Departmental Estimate for the year 1897 be forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 7th proximo. Referred to the President.

From the Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. Returning proposed rules, as revised by him, to govern fences in front of Parks, as provided by chapter 836 of the Laws of 1306, as follows:

### Rules and Regulations.

- Adopted by the Commissioners of Public Parks, regulating and determining the height and character of fences in or about vacant or unimproved lands fronting upon or adjacent to public parks, squares and places, and regulating the exhibition of advertisements thereon, or structures intended for the exhibition of advertisements, and ordaining penalties for violation thereof, under the authority of section 688 of the Consolidation Act, as amended by chapter 836 of the Laws of 1896.
- 1. No fence in or about any vacant or unimproved land fronting upon or adjacent to any public park, square or place in the City of New York, shall be erected until a plan, showing the height, character and method of construction of the proposed fences, has been submitted to the Commissioners of Public Parks, approved by them, and a permit, in writing, issued therefor.
- 2. No poster or advertising device shall be placed upon any fence or other structure intended for advertisement or the exhibition of advertisements in, about or upon any vacant or unimproved land fronting upon or adjacent to any public park, square or place in the City of New York, until a description or drawing of the same shall be filed with the Commissioners of Public Parks, approved by them, and a permit, in writing, issued therefor.

- 3. Owners of existing fences, or other structures intended or used for advertisements, or the exhibition of advertisements, now existing in, about or upon any vacant or unimproved lands fronting upon or adjacent to any public park, square or place in the City of New York are hereby required, on or before the first day of September, 1896, to file with the Commissioners of Public Parks, a plan showing the height, character and method of construction of fences or other structures intended or used for advertisements, and a description or drawing of any poster or advertising device thereon. The Commissioners, if they approve the said fences, structures, posters or advertising devices, may issue a permit, in writing, for the continuance thereof, or may direct such change or modification therein as they may determine, and issue a written permit therefor. On and after said first day of September, 1896, no existing fence, structure intended or used for advertising purposes, device or advertisement shall be continued unless with the approval of the Commissioners of Public Parks, obtained as hereinbefore required and evidenced by their written permit.
- 4. Any person violating any of the foregoing rules and regulations shall be subject to a penalty of two hundred and fifty (250) dollars.

On motion, the foregoing rules were adopted by the following vote:

2d. From J. C. Rodgers, contractor for the second section of the Harlem River Driveway, requesting permission to use the northerly approach to the temporary Macomb's Dam Bridge for the purpose of loading boats with loam. Referred to the Commission on Harlem River Driveway.

From Ralph A. Gushee, applying for permission to obtain an excise license permitting the service of wines and liquors with food at Claremont on Sundays.

On motion, the consent of the Board was given to the making of applications by the licensees of McGown's Pass Tavern and Claremont for excise licenses, permitting the sale of wines and liquors when served with meals in those restaurants on Sundays, by the following vote:

From the Captain and Surgeon of Police, reporting the death on the 23d inst. of Officer Thomas R. McIntyre, who was killed while in the performance of his duty in stopping a runaway horse on West Seventy-second street.

Whereas, The death of Officer Thomas R. McIntyre, which occurred on the 23d inst., while in the discharge of his duty in stopping a runaway horse, has removed from the Police force of the Department a brave and efficient officer, with a record of over ten years of faithful service;

From the Clerk of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

1st. Transmitting a copy of a resolution authorizing the erection of a new bridge on or near the site of the old City Island Bridge, as provided by chapter 638, Laws of 1894, amended by chapter 507, Laws of 1896, and authorizing the issue of bonds to the amount of fifteen thousand dollars for the payment of engineering, drafting and other expenses necessary to the preparation of plans and specifications for the said bridge. Filed.

2d. Advising the Department of the action of said Board in authorizing the application of the balance, amounting to \$24,913.16, remaining unexpended of the amount apportioned for Riverside Park retaining walls, to other work in connection with the improvement of the said park, now in progress, under chapter 120 of the Laws of 1895. From the Clerk of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, forwarding a copy of a resolution approving plan for slate platform step around the centre pool of the Aquarium, and also specifications for new radiators in the Aquarium building. Filed.

From the Counsel to the Corporation, advising the Department as to its powers and duties with regard to the approval of plans of buildings proposed to be erected by the Board of Managers of the New York Botanical Garden on their reservation in Bronx Park. Filed.

From the Commissioner of Public Works, in relation to the pavement of the roadway of Fifth avenue.

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement be respectfully requested to widen West Ninety-sixth street by adding five feet on both the northerly and southerly sides thereof, from the west side of West End avenue to the east side of Riverside Drive, and to direct the Counsel to the Corporation to initiate a proceeding for acquiring title to the lands required for such additional width at the earliest date practicable.
