Proposals.

At the hour of ten o'clock, the Comptroller of the city being present, and the meeting open to the public, the President, in the presence of the Comptroller and of such of the parties making proposals as were present, opened the estimate-box, and publicly opened and read the estimates or proposals which had been received on 2d inst., in pursuance of advertisements duly published in the City Record, and the opening of which had been postponed in the absence of a quorum, for the following works, namely:

No. 1. For constructing a sewer and appurtenances in One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, between College avenue and One Hundred and Forty-third street.

- No. 2. For constructing a sewer and appurtenances in North Third avenue and Boston road, between Brook avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, with branch in North Third avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-third and One Hundred and Sixty-fourth streets.
- No. 3. For regulating and grading Lincoln avenue, and also setting curb-stones and flagging the sidewalks from the northern curb line of the Southern Boulevard to the eastern curb line of North Third avenue.
- No. 4. For regulating and grading Willis avenue, and also setting curb-stones, paving gutters, and flagging sidewalks therein, between the Southern Boulevard and North Third avenue.
- No. 5. For regulating and grading Courtland avenue, and also setting curb and flagging therein, from North Third avenue to East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street.
- No. 6. For laying a crosswalk across the roadway of Washington avenue at each of the intersections of East one Hundred and Sixty-sixth, East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh, East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth, East One Hundred and Seventy-second, East One Hundred and Seventy-second, East One Hundred and Seventy-third, and East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth streets, and across the roadway of each of the above-mentioned streets at its intersection with Washington avenue.
- No. 7. For constructing a sewer and appurtenances in One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, between Willis and Brook avenues, with a branch in Brown place, between One Hundred and Thirty-eighth and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets.

The Comptroller then retired.

The minutes of the meetings of April 25 and May 2 were read and approved.

The following communications were received:

Water in fountains.

From the Commissioner of Public Works, in relation to the limited supply of water for ornamental fountains, etc.

Referred to Commissioner Crimmins to report as to the advisability of filling in and planting the fountains in the City Parks.

Counsel to the Corporation—Bid of McGrath & Dunn.

From the Counsel to the Corporation, in relation to the informality in the proposal of McGrath & Dunn, the lowest bidders for mason and stone work, and stating that, in his opinion, it would be for the interest of the city to reject all the bids and readvertise the work.

Commissioner Crimmins offered the following:

A communication from Louis D. Beck was received and ordered entered at length upon the minutes, as follows:

New York, May 11, 1883, Post-office Box 3015.

To the Commissioners of Public Parks of the City of New York, No. 36 Union Square:

Gentlemen—Allow me herewith to submit to your Honorable Board my price for best double screened Roa Hook gravel for roads and walks, for this season, quality to be the same as that delivered by me to your Department for the past two years. In this connection I would state, that being the sole agent and representing by both power of attorney and otherwise the owner of the said Roa Hook bank, have deemed it advisable (that the standard of the gravel may be kept up) to refuse to name a price to a third party at my dock at Roa Hook for the grade of gravel delivered to your Department, and although requested almost daily to do so, will continue to refuse, it being in my judgment far more satisfactory to all concerned to do business direct.

As I have explained to some members of your Board my manner of preparation, and that the cost, etc., of such preparation was based upon the amount required, it is useless to go into an explanation again here. My interests, as far as the gravel business is concerned, are entirely connected with the Roa Hook bank at Peekskill, the quality, the preparation, etc., to have the standard kept up, and not with the freighting and hauling here, incident upon the delivery on the roads. If your Board should see fit to order my gravel at dock at Roa Hook, and will receive and measure it there, putting the freighting and hauling into competition, it would relieve me of much that is annoying, and by so doing you might be able to get it done at a lower figure than I am obliged to pay. If this plan meets the approval of your Board, I will gladly name a price to them.

For the information of the gentlemen who have but recently come into your Board, I beg leave to make a statement which speaks for itself in favor of my mode of preparation of the gravel. The first year I took the matter of preparation in my own hands and dealt directly with your Department, it used in repairs, etc., over 10,000 yards; the next, although it was thought it would take nearly the same amount and my price was based upon that, it took only 6,800 yards to do the work; this season I learn that even a less amount is estimated upon. I think it is due to myself and the quality of gravel I have been delivering to make the above statements before submitting my price.

For the amount I learn that will be required this year, I submit the following for best double-screened Roa Hook gravel, delivered on the park drives, etc., as the Superintendent may direct, two dollars and thirty cents per cubic yard (\$2.30), delivery to begin after ten days' notice, so that I may prepare screens, etc.

Corporation Counsel-Lost property.

Commissioner Wales presented the following opinion from the Counsel to the Corporation relative to disposing of the "lost property" in the possession of the Department:

> LAW DEPARTMENT, OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION, NEW YORK May 16, 1883.

Hon. SALEM H. WALES,

Commissioner of the Department of Public Parks:

SIR-I duly received your letter of the 12th ultimo, in which you ask me what legal disposition your department can make of certain articles of personal property, of the nature of wearing apparel, etc., which from time to time, for a period of years, have been found in the public parks of this city, and are now in the custody of the Park Property Clerk.

Also, if certain small sums of money found under like circumstances, and which are now in like custody, can be properly turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by your department.

No absolute right to sell lost articles which have been found within the park limits has been expressly conferred upon your Board by virtue of any law with which I am acquainted. At the same time I am of opinion that such "estrays," if kept by you for a reasonable time, without claim being made therefor by the owners, could safely be sold by you at public auction. What is a reasonable time must depend much upon the nature of the article found, and whether a year, more or less, is a matter that would have to be left to the discretion of the

Once the department feels that there is no likelihood of the assertion of any claim of ownership, a rule of procedure is furnished by section 62 of chapter 400 of the Laws of 1882, known as the Consolidation Act. This section is as

"All property sold, other than land under water, shall be sold at public "auction, after previous public notice, under the superintendence of the appro"priate head of department. The proceeds of all sales made under and by
"virtue of this act shall, except as herein otherwise specially provided, be by "the officer receiving the same immediately deposited with the Chamberlain; "and the account of sales, verified by the officer making the sales, shall be "immediately filed in the office of the Comptroller."

Pursuant to this section, I am of opinion that the proceeds of said sale, and as well the sums of money found within the public park territory, to which you refer in your letter, should not be paid to the Sinking Fund Commissioners for the account of their fund, but to the Chamberlain, for the account of the General Fund, as it is called; the office of which is the reduction of the amount of moneys to be annually raised by taxation.

As to the character of the notice of sale, I think advertisement in the City Record sufficient, pursuant to section 66 of the Consolidation Act, which con-

tains, among other things, the following provision:

"All advertising required to be done for the city, except as in this act other-wise especially provided, and all notices required by law or ordinance to be "published in corporation papers, shall be inserted at public expense only in "the City Record, and a publication therein shall be a sufficient compliance "with any law or ordinance requiring publication of such matters or notices." I am, sir, yours respectfully,

GEORGE P. ANDREWS, Counsel to the Corporation. Lost articles - Deposit money - Sell articles.

Commissioner Wales offered the following:

Resolved, That the Treasurer be authorized to deposit the money now in the hands of the Property Clerk, returned to him as lost property found on the parks, with the City Chamberlain to the credit of the General Fund, and that the balance of said property be included in the next auction sale of property to be held on the Central Park.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all of the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Viele, Wales, Crimmins, Olliffe—4.

Bridge above High Bridge.

Commissioner Crimmins offered the following:

Whereas, By chapter 534 of the Laws of 1871 the Board of Commissioners of Parks was fully authorized forthwith to commence the building or construction of a bridge over the Harlem river north of High Bridge, but not more than a half mile therefrom; and

Whereas, The land for the approaches to the bridge on both sides of the river has been long since taken and paid for by the city, and the amount thereof, to wit, \$37,751.78, has

been assessed upon the owners of property; and

Whereas, The increase in population in the upper part of our city, and the pressing need of greater facilities for traveling across the Harlem river, demand immediate action on the part of this Board to insure the speedy erection of said bridge,

Resolved, That Commissioner Wales be appointed to confer with the Engineer or Engineers as to the proper place for the proposed bridge, and the probable cost of the same, and that such Commissioner report as soon as practicable to this

Board the result of the conference.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said preamble and resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all of the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Viele, Wales, Crimmins, Olliffe—4.

Transfer-Riverside Park.

Commissioner Viele offered the following:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to transfer from the appropriation "For the Improvement and Maintenance of Riverside Park "and Avenue" 1882, for which it is not required, the sum of ten thousand (\$10,000) dollars to the appropriation "For the Improvement and Maintenance of Riverside Avenue," 1883, which is insufficient in consequence of the repairs needed on retaining walls that have fallen down.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all of the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Viele, Wales, Crimmins, Olliffe—4.

Riverside avenue-Retaining wall.

Commissioner CRIMMINS called up the plan for rebuilding retaining wall on the west side of Riverside avenue, at One Hundred and Third street and at One Hundred and Fifteenth street, and offered the following:

Resolved, That the plan and specifications for rebuilding retaining wall on the west side of Riverside avenue, at One Hundred and Third street and One Hundred and Fifteenth street, be approved and ordered printed, and when so printed and approved as to form by the Counsel to the Corporation, that the Secretary be directed to insert advertisements in the City Record, inviting proposals for doing the work.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all of the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Viele, Wales, Crimmins, Olliffe—4.

Parkkeepers-Quarters.

On motion of Commissioner Wales, it was

Resolved, That Commissioner Viele be requested to report as to the practicability of moving the quarters of the Police

force from the basement to the first floor of the Arsenal building.

Riverside avenue—Building regulations.

Commissioner VIELE called up the regulations for establishing the limits of projections, etc., on the Riverside avenue, presented to the Board and laid over, October 4, 1882, and presented the following amended regulations, and moved their adoption:

PROPOSED REGULATIONS FOR ESTABLISHING LIMITS OF PROJEC-TION FOR CONSTRUCTIONS ON THE LINE OF RIVERSIDE AVENUE.

- I. No structure or construction of any description or part thereof shall be placed or permitted on or under Riverside avenue, until a plan and elevation thereof, with proposed dimensions plainly marked, shall have first been filed in the Department of Public Parks; said plans and application to be accompanied by the written consent of the adjoining owners of fifty feet front of property on either side, where the erection fronts solely on the avenue, and for fifty feet on the avenue and fifty feet front on the street adjoining where the erection is to be made on a corner lot, and a special permission had and obtained from the said Department for such structure or construction as applied for.
- II. No permission for placing or continuing any structure or construction of any description within the limits of Riverside avenue shall be given, except the same is in accordance with the following limitations:
- A (a) Stoops or steps, courtyards and areas, or any part or appurtenance thereof, shall not project in the avenue beyond the building line to the extent of more than—

5 feet where the sidewalk is 16 feet wide: 7 " 20 " 25 "

and in proportion to the above where the sidewalk is between sixteen and twenty feet or between twenty and twenty-five feet.

- (b) No stoop or steps shall be covered, except over the landing or platform at the top; nor shall they be inclosed, except by an open railing not more than four feet in height.
- B (a) Bay-windows shall not project in the avenue beyond the building line to the extent of more than four feet.

The above shall apply only to bay-windows not extending higher than the second floor of the building from which they project.

- (b) Where bay-windows extend higher than the second floor of the building from which they project, the limit given in the preceding paragraph shall be decreased one foot for each additional story in height of the bay-window.
- (c) Bay-windows, nor any part or appurtenance thereof, when allowed to project in the avenue, shall not occupy longitudinally with the avenue more than two-thirds of the width of the building from which they project.
- C (a) No balcony, cornice or ornament shall project in the avenue beyond the house-line to the extent of more than four feet.
- (b) No balcony shall be inclosed on the front or sides except by a railing not over four feet in height.
- D No vault or other construction below the sidewalk shall be built, except in such manner as shall leave the sewers, gas and water pipes, or space proposed to be occupied by the same, free and uninclosed, and in safe condition; nor, in any case, to extend in the clear beyond the curb-line.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said regulations, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all of the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Executive Session

On motion of Commissioner VIELE, at 11.35 o'clock A. M., the Board went into Executive Session.

Topographical Engineer.

From the Topographical Engineer, recommending that the employees on the force under him be relieved from their

duties at three o'clock on Saturdays during the summer season.

Saturday vacation.

On motion, the Topographical Engineer was authorized to allow the persons employed on the force under him to stop work at three o'clock on Saturdays during the summer, excepting such persons as are employed on contract works, said absence to be only whenever the condition of the force and the work on which they are engaged will permit.

Inspector on Alexander avenue.

From the Acting Engineer of Construction, recommending the employment of an additional Inspector on the work of grading, paving, etc., Alexander avenue.

Commissioner CRIMMINS moved that the President be authorized to select a person for appointment as Inspector on said work.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said motion, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all of the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Viele, Wales, Crimmins, Olliffe—4.

Riverside Park-Employment of laborers and rockmen.

From the Superintendent of Parks, recommending that Bartholomew Doyle, John D. Malone, Francis Clark and Edward Shay, employed as rockmen on Riverside Park, be reduced to the grade of laborers, and that Daniel Sullivan, Matthew Rahl, Patrick McGrath and Thomas Shannahan, laborers, be promoted to the grade of rockmen.

Commissioner Viele moved that the recommendation of the Superintendent of Parks be approved.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said motion, and it was determined in the affirma-

tive, a majority of all of the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

23d and 24th Wards-Employment of men.

From the Superintendent of Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, recommending the employment of stone masons and rockmen for work on the approaches to the Bronx river bridges.

Resolved, That the employment of four rockmen, three stone masons for work on approaches to Bronx river bridges, and twenty-four laborers for work on maintenance of Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, be and the same is hereby authorized.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all of the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Pay of laborers cleaning sewers.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the negative, a majority of all of the members of the Board not voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Mowers and Workers on tar walks-Pay of.

From the Superintendent of Parks, recommending an increase of pay for mowers, and graders and layers of tar walks during the summer.

Resolved, That the pay of mowers and layers and graders of tar walks be fixed at \$2 per day during the months of June, July and August of the present year.

Promotions for efficiency.

Commissioner Wales offered the following as a substitute:

To secure better service and encourage emulation among the laborers now employed in care and maintenance of the parks; be it

Resolved, That thirty men be selected from the present force by the Superintendent of Parks, on the recommendation

of the several Foremen, for promotion to the grade of skilled laborers, in recognition of their efficiency and disposition to render good service, and that the Superintendent report at the next regular meeting of this Board the names of the men to be promoted, together with a statement of the kind of work upon which the men are now or have been employed, and upon approval by this Board the men so promoted be paid two dollars per day, to take effect on the first day of July, 1883.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said amendment, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all of the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said motion, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all of the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

From N. P. Bailey and S. L. M. Barlow, for permission to regulate, grade, etc., at their own expense, and under the supervision of this Department, Sedgwick avenue from the Fordham road to the Kingsbridge road.

Commissioner VIELE offered the following:

Whereas, Nathaniel P. Bailey and Samuel L. M. Barlow, property-holders in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York, have petitioned that they themselves may do the work of opening the proposed extension to Sedgwick avenue, in said city, between its point of intersection with the Fordham Landing road and its intersection with the Kingsbridge road in the said Twenty-fourth Ward, under the supervision of a proper inspector and engineer, at their own expense, including the charges of the inspector and engineer;

Resolved, That the prayer of said petitioners be granted, and they themselves allowed to do such work, upon the following terms, conditions and stipulations:

I.—The work shall be under the immediate supervision of the Acting Engineer of Construction of the Department of Public Parks. It shall conform strictly to the grades and lines heretofore established for said portion of Sedgwick avenue, in accordance with law.

II.—The amount of "surveyor's fees," namely, ten cents per lineal foot for the feet, to be deposited with the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks.

III.—The Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks to appoint an inspector to supervise the execution of the work, to be paid \$3 per diem. The petitioners to deposit with the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, before work is actually begun, a sum sufficient to pay said inspector, at the above-named rate, for twice the time agreed

upon by their contractor for doing the work; and if this sum should prove insufficient, then, from time to time, upon five (5) days' notice, such additional sum as the said Commissioners may determine to be necessary to pay said inspector, to be deposited with said Commissioners.

IV.—The regulating and grading shall extend over the full width of the avenue. Slopes in excavation and embankment to extend over adjacent private property.

V.—Proper, easy and safe connections to be graded from the new work to the present roadway at Kingsbridge road and Fordham Landing road.

VI.—Any destruction of, or injury to, gas or water pipes or appurtenances thereof, or any loss or damage to the city arising from the work, to be paid for by said petitioners.

VII.—No estimate to be paid to any contractor for said grading until the same has been approved of by the Engineer of the Department of Public Parks.

VIII.—The Engineer of the Department of Public Parks not to be called upon to give an exact estimate of work until its final completion; nor to give approximate estimates oftener than once a month, and then only when the amount of work done since previous estimate would amount to at least \$1,000.

IX.—The specifications included in the contract for doing the work to be approved by the Engineer of the Department of Public Parks.

X.—This permit shall be void after the expiration of two (2) years from date.

XI.—And that the said work shall be done in all respects according to law, and the said petitioners shall indemnify and save harmless the City of New York and the Department of Public Parks, and Commissioners thereof, of and from all loss and damage, liability and claims arising out of, or in any way connected with said work.

By-laws.

The President and Secretary, from the Committee to whom was referred the subject of revising the By-laws, presented the following report, which was ordered entered upon the minutes and laid over for the further consideration of the Board:

Department of Public Parks

OF THE

CITY OF NEW YORK.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

MEETINGS.

- SEC. 1. All meetings of the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks shall be held at their office, unless otherwise ordered by the Board.
- SEC. 2. Stated meetings shall be held the first and third Wednesdays of each month. Other meetings may be held by adjournment, on the call of the President, or at the written request of two members. The notices of the meetings called by the President, or by any two members, shall state the matter to be presented at such proposed meeting, and no other matter shall be acted on at such meetings, except by the consent of a majority of the members then present.
- SEC. 3. Meetings of the Board shall be held at 10 o'clock A. M., unless the Board otherwise orders.
- SEC. 4. Notices of meetings shall be sent to each Commissioner, at his place of address, by the Secretary, at least two days before the day of the meeting for which notice is given.

ARTICLE II.

OFFICERS.

SEC. 1. The officers of the Board shall be as follows:

1st. A President.

2d. A Treasurer.

Each of whom shall hold office until the first day of May next succeeding his election.

PRESIDENT.

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board, and shall, at the regular meeting next succeeding his election, appoint and announce all the standing committees.

By virtue of his office, the President shall be the executive officer of the Department, and as such he shall be charged with the duty of prosecuting all the works authorized and directed by the Board, and the carrying out of all orders and directions of the Board as may be from time to time given. Subject at all times to the direction, revision, and control of the Board. He shall have power to suspend at any time any Foreman, mechanic or laborer, and upon the recommendation of the Superintendents and Engineers may transfer any Foreman, laborer or mechanic. In cases of absence over three days from duty caused alone by sickness he shall, upon the recommendation of the Superintendents, Engineers or other ranking official have power to restore such person to duty. He shall in each case report his action to the Board at the next meeting.

TREASURER.

SEC. 2. The Treasurer shall be charged with the making of purchases of all supplies, tools and materials which may be ordered by the Board or called for upon requisitions. Requisitions shall be approved of by the President before

purchases are made. The Treasurer shall perform such other duties as may from time to time be indicated by the Board and may receive such compensation as may be determined by the Board.

SEC. 3. In the event of the death, resignation or removal of any of the officers of the Board a successor may be elected at the regular meeting next succeeding such death, resignation or removal.

SECRETARY.

SEC. 4. There shall be a Secretary, who shall be the custodian of the Departmental papers, keep all the minutes and records of the Board, have a general supervision over the clerical forces and accounts of the Department, conduct the correspondence, receive the reports of the employees, promulgate the Departmental orders and perform such other duties as may be required by the Board.

SUPERINTENDENT OF PARKS.

SEC. 5. There shall be a Superintendent of Parks who shall be charged with the maintenance and care of the Central and city parks below the Harlem river, bridges over the Harlem river, and such other works as may be from time to time designated by the Board, and shall supervise and control all Foremen, laborers and others of the mechanical and working forces employed upon such works.

ENGINEER OF CONSTRUCTION.

SEC. 6. There shall be an Engineer of Construction who shall have control of the regulating, grading, curb, gutter and flagging of streets, building sewers and bridges and such other works as he may from time to time be charged with.

TOPOGRAPHICAL ENGINEER.

SEC. 7. There shall be a Topographical Engineer who shall be charged with all the work connected with the surveying,

laying-out and monumenting of streets and avenues and the preparation of maps and plans in connection therewith and for the purpose of acquiring title to lands.

ARCHITECT.

SEC. 8. There shall be an Architect who shall prepare plans for the construction and repairs of structures and other architectural, ornamental and landscape works, and have a general supervision and direction in the execution and carrying out of such plans.

SUPERINTENDING GARDENER.

SEC. 9. There shall be a Superintending Gardener who shall have charge of the trees and plants, the pruning and cultivation of the same, and the general landscape effect of all the parks.

PROPERTY CLERK.

SEC. 10. There shall be a Property Clerk who shall be the general custodian of, and responsible for, all the tools and materials, the property of the Department. He shall receive and distribute the same and keep detailed and separate accounts, showing the cost, receipt and distribution of such materials. He shall perform such other duties as may be required of him.

SUPERINTENDENT TWENTY-THIRD AND TWENTY-FOURTH WARDS.

SEC. 11. There shall be a Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, who shall be charged with the duty of maintaining all the streets, roads, avenues and parks; the cleaning and repairing of sewers, drains and culverts, and the maintaining and repair of all bridges over streams in said district.

PARK AND GATE KEEPERS.

SEC. 12. There shall be a Captain of Police, whose duty it shall be to direct and supervise the various park and gate keepers in the employ of the Department, and to report daily everything relating to the force under his command, in the form, manner and under such regulations as may be prescribed by the Board.

SEC. 13. There shall be four Sergeants of Police, whose number may, from time to time, be increased as may be required, and who shall assist the Captain in the discharge of his duties.

SEC. 14. There shall be a Surgeon of Police, who shall look after and care for the health and physical condition of the members of the park and gate keepers' force. All cases of sickness or accident to members of the force shall at once be reported to the Sergeant in charge of the station, and by him immediately reported to the Surgeon. Keepers doing duty on the lower parks may, in case of sickness or accident, report immediately to the Surgeon in person.

The Surgeon shall, on the first of January in each year, make to the Board a detailed written report of the physical condition of each and every member of the park and gate keepers' force. He shall, from time to time, make such special reports as he may deem necessary.

SEC. 15. All appointments to and removals from this force shall be by the order of the Board. Appointments shall be made only after the applicant has submitted to a physical examination and been reported upon favorably by the Surgeon of Police.

Applicants for appointment on the force shall be required to write the answers to the questions called for in the application in their own handwriting, without any aid, assistance or suggestions from any other person. Any false statement, evasion or deception in answering said questions will be suffi-

cient ground for rejection of the application or of dismissal from the force.

No person shall be appointed to the police force of this Department without the presentation by the applicant of a certificate that he has passed, successfully, the final examination of the fourth grade of a grammar school in the City of New York, or a certificate from a principal of a grammar school in this city, that the applicant has successfully passed an equivalent examination before such principal and such public school teachers as he may have associated with himself.

All trials of park and gate keepers shall be conducted by the President or by a Commissioner designated for that purpose.

ARTICLE III.

GENERAL PROVISIONS.

- SEC. 1. No person in the service of the Board above the grade of the working force, shall be absent from duty without leave or an excuse satisfactory therefor to the head of the office in which he is employed.
- SEC. 2. No committee, officer or member of the Department or person employed by this Board, shall make any purchase or incur any liability in relation to the Department, its officers or employees, unless in pursuance of power delegated by order of the Board or by the act by which it is organized.
- SEC. 3. Any employee of the Department may at any time be suspended from duty by writing signed by two members of the Board; but such suspension shall not continue beyond the next succeeding meeting of the Board unless otherwise ordered by a majority vote of the Board.
- SEC. 4. Before any engagement is made to place a statue, or allow a statue to be placed, on the Parks, it shall be seen in a finished condition, or in the form of a finished model, and a

judgment as to its merits as a work of art shall have been requested of the respective Presidents of the National Academy of Design, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and the New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects.

The determination of a site for any statue shall be reserved until after its acceptance.

Plans and elevations for the pedestals of statues to be placed on the Parks, shall be submitted to and approved by the Department.

ARTICLE IV.

STANDING COMMITTEES.

- SEC. 1. There shall be an Executive Committee, an Auditing Committee, each to consist of two members, and such other Standing Committees as may, from time to time, be determined upon.
- SEC. 2. The Executive Committee shall act on such subjects, and perform such duties, as shall be specially, from time to time, referred to it by the Board.
- SEC. 3. All bills, claims and accounts, before being submitted to the Board for approval, shall be examined and audited by at least one member of the Auditing Committee. All bills shall be passed on separately by the Board.

The President shall be ex-officio a member of the Executive and Auditing Committees.

ARTICLE V.

RULES OF ORDER.

The order of business at meetings of the Board, except otherwise ordered, shall be:

1st. Reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting.

2d. Communications.

3d. Reports of Standing Committees.

4th. Reports of Special Committees and Officers.

5th. Motions and Resolutions.

6th. Miscellaneous Business.

The Ayes and Noes shall be called and recorded, on all appropriations of money, and on all other questions, at the request of one Commissioner.

All resolutions shall be in writing, with the name of the mover thereon.

All reports shall be in writing, unless otherwise agreed to and signed by a majority of the committee to whom the matter was referred, and shall state the facts upon which the same is based and their conclusions thereon.

The Board shall be governed by the common parliamentary law, as far as applicable, as laid down in Cushing's Manual.

All resolutions and propositions presented to the Board, for altering in any manner the adopted design or plan of the Central Park improvement, or for any structure upon the Parks, shall be referred to a special committee, who shall report upon the same, before any further action thereon is had by the Board.

No by-law shall be altered, repealed or adopted, without the report of a committee thereon, nor without the assent of a majority of the whole Board, nor at the same meeting at which it is proposed, unless by the unanimous consent of all the members of the Board.

McComb's Dam Bridge-Over track N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R.

The President appointed Commissioner Crimmins a committee to confer with the officers of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company in relation to crossing their tracks at the north end of McComb's Dam Bridge over Harlem river.

Fallon, Jos. -- Appointed.

Commissioner Crimmins offered the following:

Resolved, That Joseph Fallon be and he is hereby appointed a painter on the force of the Department.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all of the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Whereas, By the provisions of an act of the Legislature, entitled "An Act relative to the improvement of certain portions "of the counties of Westchester and New York, including "provisions for communications between said counties, and "for improving the navigation of Harlem river and Spuy-"ten Duyvil creek," passed April 15, 1871, being chapter 534 of the Laws of that year, it was made the duty of this Board to devise and prepare the plan and location of all bridges, tunnels and other means of transit across or under said river and creek, and this Board was further authorized and empowered to "forthwith commence the building or construction of a suspension bridge north of the bridge known as "the High Bridge, but not more than half a mile therefrom;" and

Whereas, This authority was conferred in recognition of a long-existing and urgent necessity for means of more perfect connection and speedier communication between the districts lying on both shores of the Harlem river, in the locality specified: and

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks have designated and located at or near One Hundred and Eighty-first street and Tenth avenue a site for such suspension bridge over the Harlem River, whose especial advantages of position are manifest, and the land necessary for the approaches to such bridge at that point has been long since condemned by the city, and paid for by an assessment levied therefor upon the property adjoining, to the amount of \$37,751.78, and the requisite preparatory surveys and soundings for the construction thereof have been completed; and

Whereas, A large number of prominent citizens have presented a petition to this Board for the immediate completion

of the said bridge, as so located; and

Whereas, The greatly increased development of the areas of highways in the territory on both sides of the Harlem River, at the site designated, has rendered the construction of said bridge practically indispensable as a means of communication between said districts; therefore

Resolved, That invitations be extended to four bridge engineers to examine the location indicated, and submit to this

Board, within thirty days, plans and estimates for the construction of said bridge.

That the Secretary be directed to send such invitations to

such engineers as may be designated.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said preamble and resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all of the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

DOCUMENT No. 94.

BOARD

OF THE

Department of Public Parks.

NOVEMBER 7, 1883.

Commissioner Wales called the attention of the Board to a document presented by the Executive Committee of the Council of Reform and presented a statement.

Ordered, That the statement, as presented, be printed in document form and a copy of the same transmitted to each member of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

E. P. BARKER, Secretary. Commissioner Wales called the attention of the Board to the City Record of November 2, 1883, which contains a document presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at its meeting of October 30, by the Executive Committee of the Council of Reform, which purports to give facts and figures in relation to the estimates of this Department, and expressed the desire that if this Board approve, the Secretary be directed to transmit to his Honor the Mayor, as Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, a communication in substance as follows:

That the Document of 1881, as published in the City Record, is full of false statements and misrepresentations, and by its own date has no proper reference to the estimates now before you; that it is a reissue of an old document which at the time of its presentation to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was shown to be unreliable in its details and unworthy of public confidence; that the statements therein contained are so lacking in fairness and intelligence that they convict their author either of the grossest ignorance of the subjects he undertakes to discuss, or of a wicked perversion of facts easily ascertainable from the records and operations of the Department. The document in question is so full of statements at variance with truth and fairness that the Commissioners cannot, without exceeding reasonable limits, undertake to notice each and every misrepresentation.

We beg leave, however, to present some extracts from communications addressed to this Board. Under date of December 26, 1882, Mr. Edgar B. Van Winkle, Topographical Engineer, whose high character and long connection with the Department entitles him to the confidence of all just men, took notice of the attack made upon his work by this so-called "Council of Reform" and comments upon it as follows:

"A document has again been presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by an agent of the Council of Reform, among other things reflecting seriously on the conduct of the work with which I am specially charged.

"If this document was simply considered by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment—who are familiar with the character of this and similar attacks—it would seem a waste of time to reply to it, but when it appears masquerading in the public press as a carefully prepared instrument of reform, the case becomes different and constrains me to make a brief counterstatement.

"Most of the allegations made under the heading of 'Surveying, Monumenting, Laying-out, and Mapping, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards,' are not only stupid and absurd, but positively false. Similar statements published in regard to private corporations or individuals, would subject the compounder of them to prosecution for libel.

"The most charitable assumption that can be made, is that the ignorance and animus of the writer has rendered him only too ready to be misled by interested parties.

"The first statement is that '\$23,000 are again asked for the same work that was contracted out by the Park Commissioners, under the same specifications that the Department is now working under, and paid for ten years ago on the production of the maps of the work, which are now in use in the office of the Comptroller, and are on file in the office of the Park Department, and have been since that time.'

"This eminently lucid and truthful statement needs one mere trifling correction, to wit:

"Not one cent is asked for the same work that was contracted out and paid for ten years ago."

The second sentence says as follows:

- "'Since the annexation of this district, and after the construction works of the parks had ceased, the force of engineers engaged on construction have been transferred and continued on this work of surveying and mapping out this district.'
- "Another slight correction is again required. One only of my force now, merely an assistant with a salary of about \$3.33 per diem, was engaged on the original construction work of the park. It is also true that this assistant worked outside of the Department for a number of years after being engaged on the construction of the park, and that he is not, nor ever has, to my knowledge, been engaged upon the work of surveying, laying-out and monumenting the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.
- "The third statement is that 'with every new succession of Park Commissioners the Chief Engineer has usually been changed, who on the plea of improving on the work of his predecessor has repeated these surveys.'
- "This again is unqualifiedly false as far as my record is concerned, and I sincerely believe it to be equally so of that of my predecessors.
- "The statement is made that in this manner \$229,000 have been spent on this work since the annexation."
- "The books of the Department show that, everything included, the amount expended for Surveying, Laying-out and Monumenting, and the making of maps for the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, from the middle of 1874 (when the operations under chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874 commenced) to and including the year 1881, was \$160,726.13.
- "Farther on it is stated that no map of these surveys for the use of the city officers has yet been produced, while in the first sentence quoted above it speaks of maps of the work

made ten years ago now in use in the office of the Comptroller.

"I beg leave to remind you that for the 14,573 acres, with the laying-out and monumenting of which the Department of Public Parks is charged, plans for the laying out of over 13,000 acres are now on file in two of the city offices.

"These plans have been accurately marked on the ground by means of permanent monuments for an acre of at least 6,000 acres.

"Plans for the sewerage system of 1,848 acres have been filed in five different city offices.

"The statement is then made that 'we are assured by engineers of the highest character that \$125,000 would have been an ample allowance for this work under the specifications in force.'

"If this means anything, it is that \$125,000 would have been an ample amount to accomplish the work of making exact, accurate and detailed surveys, and topographical surveys and maps; the maturing plans for a complete laying out of a system of streets and the physical determination of those streets on the ground by means of monuments; the carefully considered establishment of grades for the same streets; the complete preparation of a system of sewerage in harmony with the plan and grades of these streets, and the preparation of a complete set of maps showing the exact dimensions, areas and relative locations of all subdivisions of private property; the exact determination of miles of pier and bulkhead lines; the careful determination of the location of bridges and tunnels over the Harlem and Bronx rivers; the making of thorough searches and investigations, with reports on thousands of questions in connection with the real estate and its improvement for over 14,000 acres of city property.

"The engineers of the highest character who made any such assertion that all this could be properly accomplished for \$125,000, were certainly not engineers of the highest intelligence."

"As to an 'honest investigation' of the work referred to, I can simply say that I should be sincerely pleased should such an investigation by disinterested experts of the conduct of the work under my charge be made, and every assistance in my power should be rendered them."

It is absolutely false to say, as the memorialists do, "that in the year 1877, upon an appropriation of \$140,000, the parks were maintained in a high degree of excellence." On the contrary it is well known to all who were familiar with the facts that at that time and subsequently the parks were in a state of wretched neglect.

It is but just, however, to the then Commissioners to say that they made repeated statements to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Department had not funds sufficient to properly maintain the parks.

This unfortunate state of things continued to the end of the year 1880—as will be seen by a report to the Board on the condition of the parks, made by Commissioner Wales in February, 1881—after reviewing at considerable length the various subdivisions of departmental works, the report closes as follows:

"Our maintenance appropriation for this year is not sufficient to enable us to put the Central Park in a condition to meet the demands of an exacting public opinion.

"The neglect of past years cannot be remedied in a single season, but we are bound to do the best we can with the means placed at our disposal. "I am aware that this is a very thankless business, but the public will understand that these great and valuable pleasure grounds cannot be completed and properly maintained without large expenditures of money.

"Reviewing the situation of the Department, without prejudice, I am of the opinion that it is more thoroughly out of order, and requires more vigorous attention than any other Department of the city government.

"Such, briefly and in mere outline, is the uncomfortable legacy to which we have succeeded. The duties imposed upon us will tax to the utmost our time and attention, and that the public may not in justice hold us responsible for a condition of things which some of us, at least, have had no share in creating, I desire that this statement be entered upon the minutes of the Board."

To all fair-minded citizens it is a manifest injustice to compare the maintenance of Central Park with the pasturage of St. Louis and other cities, or with well-kept cemeteries, which, in addition to corporate care, receive an enormous amount of attention and expense from the loving-kindness of those who care for and cherish these resting-places of the dead.

In considering the cost of maintenance, it must be borne in mind that the Central Park is the most elaborate and costly piece of landscape engineering of its size in the world. It is subject to an enormous wear and tear, which in a short time would destroy any private pleasure-ground or cemetery. As bearing on the subject of maintenance, we present the following extract from a letter addressed to this Board by the Superintendent of Parks, in December, 1882. He says:

"As no comparison is practical between the matters contrasted in the memorial in question, I have asked the accomplished bookkeeper of the Department to make up the cost of maintaining the turfed surfaces in Central Park, the one common feature of farms, of parks, and of cemeteries, and find

that it amounts to a little over \$20,000, or a little less than an average of \$3 per acre on the amount of cultivated surface allowed by the memorialists."

"It is singular that the memorialists have unhappily left out of the calculation the cost and labor expended upon the great improvements which have been made in the parks, especially in Central Park, since the autumn of 1881. They assume that in the metropolis of the United States, the citizens who drive, ride, and walk, are willing that their parks should be in the condition of Prospect Park, in Brooklyn, of Fairmount Common in Philadelphia, and of others named as standards of excellence. The protests of the whole community against the state of things of the past, shows a better appreciation of the efforts of the designers of the parks and of the present management. Perhaps the progress made in the last year has been so quiet and so gradual as not to be noticeable by the Council; but the change, nevertheless, has been great. The gardeners and their attendants have cleared away over 4,000 cart-loads of dead-wood, rubbish, and prunings. The same work continues in the same manner as it was commenced; over 3,500 loads of compost and manures have been hauled upon the meadows and lawns; above 200 acres of meadows and lawns were seeded last spring, and over 150 tons of prime hay harvested in the summer; more than 12,000 plants have been planted in the circles and flower-beds, and new gravel has been laid on five miles of the drives; 148,852 square feet of new walk have been laid, and 56,000 square feet resurfaced."

"In the mechanical department, besides the renovating of rolling-stock and the making of new implements, the rotten floors of bridges have been relaid for the safety of pedestrians, iron bridges which had not been painted before for thirteen years, and the ornamental iron of which was almost eaten away with rust, have been cleaned and painted, as have also the railings of the small parks of the city. The urinals have been cleaned and painted with two coats; the boat-houses

and all the park cottages have been repaired and painted; all the park seats and stationary benches and the music stand in the Mall have been repaired and painted; the fence around Mount Morris Park has been painted and restored; drains have been relaid and basins have been built. This work, which had been neglected for years, has been done in addition to the regular work of maintenance, and done, too, with seventy-five less men than were employed before."

It is not claimed that the administration of the affairs of this Department is by any means perfect. The Commissioners have set up for themselves no superlative standard of official righteousness—their meetings are open to the public; their acts are public acts; they have nothing which they wish to conceal from public scrutiny. Moreover, they claim no immunity from just and wholesome criticism, and would welcome any honest and sincere endeavor of any citizen, or body of citizens, to correct abuses, or to introduce any and all reforms in the administration of the trusts imposed upon them. Now, so far as the present Commissioners are aware, neither the agent of the Council of Reform, nor any member of its executive committee has applied to the Department for any information about its affairs. It must be conceded by all just men that reforms in municipal government cannot succeed by such methods as have been adopted by this so-called Council of Reform; in fact the Council admits in the opening paragraph of their document "that it has had its attention turned for several years * * * to the misleading sources of information" which is no doubt true, otherwise it would be difficult to account for their conduct in this respect. It is charitable to suppose that the Council has been too much misled.

Museum of Art Fund-Corporation Counsel's opinion.

An opinion from the Counsel to the Corporation was received and ordered entered upon the minutes, as follows, and a copy of the same transmitted to the Trustees of the Metropolitan Museum of Art:

LAW DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION,
NEW YORK, December 5, 1883.

E. P. BARKER, Esq.,

Secretary of the Department of Public Parks:

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication under date of November 22, 1883, requesting my opinion as to the powers and duties of the Department of Public Parks in the matter of a request preferred to them by the Trustees of the Metropolitan Museum of Art for the application of the funds provided in chapter 290 of the Laws of 1871, for the erection and completion of a building for the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

In 1871, by section 2 of chapter 290 of the the Laws of that year, the Commissioners of Parks were authorized to construct, erect and maintain a suitable fireproof building for the purpose of establishing and maintaining therein a Museum and Gallery of Art, at an aggregate cost not exceeding a sum, of which the annual interest, at the rate of interest at which the fund or stock should be issued, is \$35,000; and it was further made the duty of the Comptroller to create and issue such stock to an amount not exceeding the limitation above specified.

By chapter 583 of the Laws of 1871, section 4, however, it was provided that no bonds or stocks of the City and County of New York, except those authorized to be issued by the direction of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and revenue bonds should thereafter be issued, except by the concurrence and authority of all the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Under the provisions of chapter 290 there was issued \$498,000 of stock, the interest on which, as appears by the papers submitted to me, amounted to \$26,970. It is claimed by the Trustees of the Museum that the Comptroller is authorized to issue additional stock, bearing interest not to exceed \$8,030, and that the Department of Parks may make requisition for the proceds of such stock and apply the same to the completion or enlargement of the present Museum.

At what period the fireproof building referred to in chapter 290 of the Laws of 1871, was erected, I am not informed, but by chapter 385 of the Laws of 1878, the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks were authorized to equip and furnish the building now erected upon the portion of Central Park

* * * east of the old receiving reservoir "and bounded, etc.,"

under the provisions of section 2 of chapter 290 of the Laws of 1871, in a suitable mnnner, etc. I infer from this that the building had been erected prior

to the passage of the Act of 1878.

By chapter 375 of the Laws of 1881, provision was made for the enlargement of the building erected under the provisions of the Act of 1871. By its terms the Commissioners of Public Parks, with the concurrence of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, were authorized to enlarge the building under plans to be prepared by the Trustees of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and approved by the Commissioners of Public Parks. The plans might include any alteration of the present building made necessary by the enlargement, or found by experience to be desirable. To provide funds for this enlargement the Board of Estimate and Apportionment were authorized to include in the tax levy of 1882 such an amount, not exceeding \$60,000, as should be certified by the Commissioners of Public Parks upon the application of the Trustees of the Museum, to be necessary for the enlargement and alteration of the building, and the equipment of the same.

It is a well settled principle of law that where a later statue, not purporting to amend a former one upon the same subject, covers the whole subject, the former statute will be held to be repealed by necessary implication, although

the latter statute contains no repealing clause.

(Heckman v. Pinckney, 81, N. Y., 211.)

When, by the application of the funds already raised under the Act of 1871, a fireproof building of the character contemplated was erected and put in such a condition as to allow of its occupation by the Museum, the only object to be accomplished by a continued issue of stock would seem to be an enlargement of the existing structure. As the act of 1881 is concerned with the subject of an enlargement of the existing building, and provides for the necessary expense of such enlargement, it would seem to cover the whole subject with which the unexecuted provisions, above cited from the earlier statute, are concerned, and therefore, to work their repeal.

That the Act of 1881 operated to repeal the unexecuted provisions of section 2 of the Act of 1871, seems to have been the view taken of this question by the Legislature, which passed the Consolidation Act (chapter 410 of 1882); the provisions of section 1 of chapter 375 of the Laws of 1881, are embodied in section 698 of that act, while section 2 of chapter 290 of the Laws of 1871 has

been entirely omitted.

It is my opinion that irrespective of the Act of 1881, the Comptroller is not anthorized to issue the bonds provided for by chapter 290 of Laws of 1871, without first obtaining the sanction of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; that the scheme provided for by the Act of 1881, superceded the earlier one of 1871, and that any enlargement of the present structure can only be made with the concurrence of the same Board, in the manner provided in section 698 of the

Consolidated Act. Whenever the Board of Estimate concurs in any plan for such enlargement, it may of course, provide the necessary funds in the same manner as it now provides for other city charges.

This communication has been examined by the Topographical Engineer in charge of that work, who replies, "it is filled with misrepresentations and per-

versions."

It is the opinion of this Board that the communication above referred to is unworthy the notice of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as forming a basis for any conclusion by the Board as to the advisibility of the appropriation in question.

By such iustrumentalities the Department of Public Parks has been subjected to much annoyance as well as public scandal, and to an extent, in the

opinion of this Board, wholly unjustified by the facts.

The Commissioners find themselves much embarrassed from year to year in

attempting to correct these false and misleading statements.

Therefore, with a view to the definitive determination of this matter in the interests of truth and justice, they have authorized me to transmit a respectful request that your Honor will select three disinterested citizens to examine into the statements and insinuations made against the character and conduct of this Department,

E. P. BARKER, Secretary. REPORT ON THE INJURY TO THE TREES OF THE PARKS BY INSECTS.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS, NEW YORK, February 20, 1884.

The President, to whom was referred the subject of the injury to the trees of the parks from the ravages of insect parasites, submits herewith the report of Mr. E. B. Southwick, a skilled entomologist in the employ of the Department, who has devoted himself assiduously, in addition to other important duties, to the extermination of these insects. A force of men was, by direction of the Board, especially selected by the Superintendent to assist Mr. Southwick. They have been diligently at work during the past summer and autumn, and will continue the work during the present season.

The very general ravages of insect life all over the country during the past year extended to all the parks under the control of this Department. As soon as this wide-spread disaster manifested itself by the destruction of the foliage of the park trees, energetic measures were resorted to, with the results as shown in the very able report of Mr. Southwick, who, it will be seen, has extended his investigations to the entire growth of the park, resulting in the discovery that several thousand trees had been destroyed, or partially destroyed by parasites that have been at work for a considerable period of time, while the specialists not now employed who were charged with the care of these trees seem to have been totally ignorant, or grossly negligent of their duties.

The employment of a competent and faithful entomologist and botanist will, it is believed, result in the prevention of any further destruction of the park growth from this cause. A greater care should be exercised in selecting the nurseries from which trees are purchased. Some of these have been supplied from old and neglected nurseries in the neighborhood of the city, that have fallen into decay, and it is probable that from this source many of these infected trees and shrubs have been obtained.

To the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report on the Noxious Insects of the Central and City Parks and the work accomplished under my direction since the 13th of August, 1883.

The lateness of the season at which the work was commenced prevented the preservation of the foliage of many of the trees, as the insects had been at work already the whole spring and summer, yet much injury was checked by even this late interference and a very general destruction of the insects still at work was accomplished.

Although individual insects are small and inconsiderable, many of them microscopical, the great number of species and the still greater number of individuals, fully make up for their want of corporeal magnitude.

The disastrous results of their workings make it necessary that those in charge of valuable collections of trees and shrubs should understand their peculiar characteristics as clearly as possible.

The number of species is so large and their fecundity so enormous, that whole sections of country are often devastated by their ravages.

The past season has been remarkable in this respect. The destruction of birds and insectivorous animals has aided largely in the increase of insect life.

In European countries entomology and its relation to vegetable life is thought to be of as much importance as the study of the plants themselves. To understand the relation that insects bear to each other and to the plants upon which they prey, it is necessary to become thoroughly acquainted with their habits and manner of working, and more especially where years of tree growth, and the beauty of our great parks are taken into consideration.

The insects in the Central Park were found to be very numerous, and except for entomological collections seem never until now to have received any special attention, as the condition of the trees testify.

The web-spinners were particularly abundant, lining the drives and walks with their unsightly webs, and in positions less exposed often nearly covering the trees. As many as nine families having been taken from a single tree.

The birch, cherry and walnut trees suffering most from their ravages.

The Orgyia leucostigma were very abundant in the lower sections of the park, and the trees, after having been nearly defoliated by them, were covered on both trunk and branch with their cocoons; in many cases, at the base of the limbs, a mass was found, of a dozen or more layers in thickness, which held the moisture and caused a rotten spot in the tree.

The Datanas were very abundant; five pounds of solid caterpillars were taken from a single tree, and nearly fifteen pounds were taken from three small walnut trees near One Hundredth street and Eighth avenue.

The Bag-worm is also very abundant and difficult to manage, and like the Orgyia are single, and must be dealt with individually. They have been increasing until now they are able to defoliate a large number of trees, and must be destroyed to prevent them from extending their feeding-ground and distributing themselves over a larger surface. A great variety of trees suffer from this insect.

Ash trees have been destroyed in great numbers by the scale insect Mytilaspis pomorum (Bouché), which sometimes

cover the entire tree. These have undoubtedly been brought from the nursery, and were on the young trees when transplanted.

It would be as wise a policy to introduce into a herd of "thoroughbred cattle," one or two infected with a contagious disease, as a sure means of extermination, as to introduce into a plantation of valuable trees, any trees or plants infected with disease or covered with parasites.

A thorough inspection of every tree and shrub should be made before being planted, to ascertain its condition in this respect.

The Willows are very badly affected by the scale insect Mytilaspis pomorum (Bouché); a great number of them are already dead, many dying and others struggling for existence.

Whole clumps are found with but a few shoots on the outside still alive, the interior ones completely covered with insects and dead. The Poplars are also being destroyed by the same specie of scale as infest the ash and the willow, almost covering the entire tree. Many trees are already dead and others are dying.

The Oaks, besides the numerous insects that feed upon their foliage, have scale insects also preying upon them and in many cases lower branches are already dead and those next above weakened and dying, thus giving the tree an unhealthy, sickly appearance. The scale insect most abundant on the oaks is Asterodiaspis quercicola (Bouché).

The pines in great numbers are being destroyed by a scale insect, Chionaspis pinifoliæ (Fitch), and a woolly plant-louse, Chermes pinicorticis (Fitch), the branches and in many cases the trunks of the pines being literally covered with them. This insect, to an ordinary observer, has the appearance of white mould or patches of cotton on the branches and trunks of the trees.

These insects are also brought from the nursery, and under no circumstances should a tree thus affected be planted, unless properly treated and given a fair start. Another very destructive insect preys upon the pines, the white pine *Aphis*, Lachnus strobi (Fitch).

The Ailanthus also have their enemy, and many small trees were nearly defoliated by the caterpillars of Samia cynthia (Linn.), introduced some years ago from China.

The Euonymous species are being destroyed in great numbers by a scale insect, *Chionaspis euonymi* (Comstock).

The lilac, lindera, sumac and apple are all more or less affected by scale insects. The list accompanying this report will show the different species of insects taken from or found working upon the different trees and plants.

A great number of evergreens are having their leaves eaten, their cones mined and their terminal buds destroyed.

The leaves also support a great variety of plant-lice, who live upon their sap, thus weakening the tree and giving it an unhealthy appearance.

A great variety of galls are found on the different species of trees, also leaf-rollers and leaf-mines in great variety and abundance.

The Celtis trees are in some situations literally covered with galls and deformed branches. The elms, besides having the numerous caterpillars and destructive leaf-beetle, *Galeruca calmariensis* (Linn.), are being destroyed by a scale insect and a woolly aphis, which forms an excresence on the tree caused by the irritation of these insects.

The Horse-chestnut is also suffering from a scale insect besides the bag-worm and orgyia.

Innumerable number of beetles are at work on the different species of trees, the *Cyllene picta* (Drury) being one of the most prominent; many locust trees are already destroyed by their larva.

In dealing with this large, varied, and destructive element the first step was to destroy those in active operation on the different trees and shrubs, going over the whole park four times, destroying, as far as was possible, all those at work on the foliage.

After having subjected them to a thorough cleaning, the trees were again gone over, and all cocoons having eggs thereon were removed, leaving, as far as was possible, those having parasites in them until the last thorough cleaning. Nearly thirteen (13) bushels of these cocoons and eggs have been taken from the trees, and the amount of cocoons included that have already been removed would seem were it known incredible.

At the present time nearly all the trees have been cleaned of cocoons as far as could be reached by the implements, consisting of different sizes of scrapers on long or short poles, and steel brooms and brushes, as the work at hand might require. All the cocoons and eggs were carefully gathered in a basket and taken to the engine room in the Arsenal and there burned in the furnace.

All the trees on the Drive, from Fifty-ninth street to the Mall, have been cleaned to their very tips; every cocoon has been removed as far as was possible. Nearly one-half of the elms on the Mall have been thoroughly cleaned, and as the work is continued every one will be put in the best condition. This particular work is very slow and tedious, as the men have to themselves go out on the limbs, and with the implements remove the cocoons, and as is the case with the large trees on the Mall, it is almost impossible to thoroughly clean one in less than two hours.

No work has ever been done in the parks of more importance than this branch of the care of trees. The number of trees and shrubs affected by the scale insect and woolly plant-louse alone by count was three thousand and thirty-five (3,035); a large number of these trees having died have been removed.

The list accompanying this report is of the different species of insects, taken from or found working upon the trees and shrubs in the Central and City Parks, with their scientific names and the plants upon which they feed.

The number of species being three hundred and nineteen (319), representing countless myriads of individuals.

Commissioner CRIMMINS, to whom was referred the consideration of the subject of gravel for use by the Department, presented a written report.

Ordered, That the report on the subject of gravel this day presented be printed as a document of the Board.

E. P. BARKER, Secretary. The undersigned, to whom was referred the subject of gravel for use by the Department during the present season, reports in relation thereto, as follows:

In considering this subject, I have asked for and received the views of the Superintendent of Parks, and Mr. Kellogg, Engineer of Construction. Those views, the expression of their knowledge and experience of gravel for the construction and maintenance of roads, agree with my own conclusions.

Without referring to their communications, I feel qualified, from my own experience and observation of public and private works of similar character, to express an opinion, and advise as to how the interests of the Department may be best subserved in the future in the matter in question.

During the early part of the year 1883, while making an examination into this subject, there were submitted to my inspection several samples of gravel, upon which I made tests satisfactory to myself—gravel of the same color, and what would appear of the same quality, as that used with approved results in the construction of roads on the park, from the first to the present time. It has been only when this gravel was temporarily discarded, and other qualities made use of, that the condition of the drives and walks of the park has deteriorated so as to cause dissatisfaction on the part of the public.

Arguments have been repeatedly made that there is no material difference between this gravel, located at the well-known Roa Hook gravel bed, on the Hudson river, and that found on the opposite side of the river. The experience of

this Department, and of others who have purchased gravel from both beds, and had full opportunity of comparison, is sufficient to entirely dispose of these arguments. The mere fact of proximity furnishes no ground for supposing that the qualities of the two gravels are the same or at all comparable. There is as much difference between them as between the clay banks along the same river, used for brick, and which are separated by no greater distance. The clay from which the Haverstraw brick is made produces an article that has for many years commanded a market price \$1 a thousand in excess of the value of the products of other clay beds in the immediate neighborhood. Similar comparisons may be made in the case of lime rock and cement rock. The intervention of a short distance will frequently produce two greatly different grades of material.

I have made frequent examinations of Roa Hook gravel and observed its durability, and would add to its former recommendations my opinion that there is probably no gravel in this country that would compare with it for road purposes. I have taken particular occasion to notice the drives of parks in other cities of this country, and to obtain the opinions of persons connected with those parks, and from such observation and opinions it is clear to me that, unless that portion of the Prospect Park Drive be excepted, which is laid with Roa Hook gravel and which is easily distinguishable from the remainder of the drive by its superior condition, there are no gravel roads in those parks which approach the excellence of the roads in the Central Park.

It is true that the first cost of the Roa Hook gravel is higher than estimated for the competing gravel from the west bank of the Hudson. But this difference is small in amount, and is, moreover, produced by the very causes which make the Roa Hook gravel peculiarly excellent for the purposes of this Department. It arises from the special preparation to which the gravel is subjected, and which is necessary to confer upon it the qualities indispensable for use upon the

drives of the Park. The estimate received last year for gravel from the west bank of the Hudson was \$1.90 per cubic yard, while the price paid for the Roa Hook gravel, procured in limited quantities, was \$2.25. The gravel from the west bank was to be single screened only-a treatment for use which I cannot recommend under any consideration-and, moreover, its waste, after showers of rain, would probably decrease its value for road purposes ten per cent. The Roa Hook gravel, on the contrary, receives two screenings, which produces a gravel of almost clear pebbles. The whole apparent saving which would be effected by the selection of the gravel from the west bank would probably not exceed \$2,000, at present prices, and this difference would be far more than counterbalanced by the incessant inconvenience to the public, and the destruction to highly varnished carriages, which would result from the use of gravel containing any clavey substance. Illustrations of this objection may be noticed in the gravel used by the Department of Public Works in the maintenance of the Fifth avenue, adjoining the Park.

Another salient advantage of the Roa Hook gravel is observable in its adaptation to the economical and permanent repair of the roads of the Park. A gravel not possessed of the adhesive qualities of the Roa Hook, in addition to its power of resistance to rapid crushing, would have to be spread upon worn spots in deep and expensive layers, whereas the adhesiveness of the Roa Hook renders it possible to repair such places by the spreading of a thin sheet of gravel. An analogous instance may be noticed in the preferableness of Portland cement over the common Rosendale cement for distribution in thinner layers over an extended surface. The worn spots in the drives are now covered to the depth of a few inches with the Roa Hook gravel, which acquires in a short time the compactness and consistency of a single, unseparated mass.

In addition to all other arguments in favor of the Roa Hook gravel, it is to be remembered that it would be extremely unwise on the part of the Commissioners to institute experiments with any new gravel, on roads so much traveled as those under their jurisdiction.

I have accordingly no hesitation in recommending that the Treasurer be authorized to make arrangements with the owner of Roa Hook gravel bed at Peekskill, or with representatives of the owner, for furnishing a supply of gravel to the Department for use during the present season.
